THE RACES.

Esq., of the Hotel Davies. The st lions which came up to the mark were: 1st, Golden, owned by Newton Large, driven by W. T. Wynn. 2d, Black Pilot, owned by George Dockendorf, driven by Newton Lee. 3d, Israel, owned by A. C. Bell, driven by Atherton. 4th, Confidence jr., owned by W. K. McKay, driven by P. S. Brown.

The horses presented a splendid appearance as they came to the stand and were loudly cheered, Black Pilot being apparently the favorite.

First Heat—Golden got the pole, Israel second, Confidence jr. third, Black Pilot fourth. The horses got away on the third score. At the first turn Golden forged to the front, and before the three quarter pole had been reached Black Pilot captured second place, Confidence jr. breaking badly and falling to the rear. Golden trotted squarely and beautifully, and finished the heat in 2.32, Black Pilot second, Israel third, and Confidence jr. far in the rear. It is but right to say that the latter horse is slightly lame and out of condition.

Second Heat—This heat was most exciting. The struggle was between Black Pilot, Israel and Golden. Pilot drew ahead at the first turn. Golden broke and was passed by Israel. This position was maintained throughout the heat, though Golden made a plucky effort to capture second place after passing the three-quarter pole. Black Pilot having broken more than four times, was put back by the judges to fourth place. Israel first, Golden second, and Confidence, jr. third. Time, 2.33.

Third Heat.—After scoring several times, the horses got the word "go." Black Pilot having fourth position and about a length in the rear. Israel drew ahead at the first turn, very closely followed by Golden. Confidence fell away to the rear. This position was maintained till the finish, Israel trotting beautifully, and coming in in 2.33, Golden about the length of a head behind, and Black Pilot about two lengths in the rear.

RUNNING RACE. This race was for a purse of \$150. The horses which came to the mark in this race were:

Ida Gray, owned by Mr. McMouagle, Sussex N. B., and ridden by Mr F C McMannus, color red.

Lightfoot, owned by Henry Hooper, ridden by H Hooper, color blue.

Golden Maxim, owned by LeRoy Willis, St. John, N. B., ridden by owner, color yellow.

Before the race began Lewis obtained a photograph of the grand stand and the horses on the track. Golden Maxim obtained the pole, Ida Grey second, and Lightfoot third. The horses were let go on the second score. At the first turn Lightfoot obtained a lead which she held until the three-quarter pole was reached when she was passed by Golden Maxim, and almost at the same time by Ida Grey. This position was maintained till the finish, Golden Maxim being closely followed by Ida Grey. Time, 1.55.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Political Picnic at Halifax.

HALIFAX, Oct. 1.

The picnic to-day in honor of the veteran Premier and Sir John Thompson and Hon. C H Tupper was pronounced a success. The weather was delightful and the attendance reached fully 3,300. The three Cabinet Ministers occupied about two hours in their speeches and evoked much enthusiasm. Sir John Thompson dealt with the Grit cries for Unrestricted Reciprocity and Commercial Union, and the people of the Liberal Conservative party in the matter of Reciprocity being anxious for it on fair terms. He scouted the idea of there being any occasion for dread on account of the McKinley Bill or any other restriction of American legislation. If one door of the American markets were closed against us, we would open others to the British Australia, Asia, China and Japan. Hon C H Tupper's speech was a rattling one and produced a fine impression. At this point in the proceedings the Liberal Conservative Association presented Sir John A Macdonald with an address. Sir John replied at greater length than had been expected, speaking for more than half an hour. He was cheered again and again. His speech was a comprehensive review of the work of the Liberal-Conservative party, and a patriotic outlook for the Dominion, not as independent of Britain's flag, but as independent of adverse legislation at Washington. He said that a year ago the Liberals were calling out that parliament should be dissolved, while now they were loud in their fears that the House would be dissolved. He would relieve their fears by telling them there would be no dissolution this year, nor, perhaps, next year. Cheers were given for the Queen, Sir John, his colleagues, the Local member, J. F. Kenny. Sir John and party leave for St. John to-morrow evening.

The Birchall Case.

WOODSTOCK, Ont., Oct. 1.

The excitement over the Birchall trial is fast subsiding. Everybody appears perfectly satisfied as to the correctness of the verdict, and universal sympathy is felt for the young wife. Birchall shows no signs whatever of fear, and evinces no animosity towards those who testified against him. Another guard was appointed this morning, so that there will be a man in his cell with him continually, night and day. His daily walk in the jail yard has been stopped, and he will never more go down the jail stairway until he goes to the gallows.
