YOUTH STRUTS ITS STUFF AT SAINT JOHN TOURNEY

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP) — Youth came to the fore Monday in the opening round of the New Brunswick — Prince Edward Island amateur golf championship being held at nearby Riverside Golf and Country Club. The top four golfers were under 30 and two are still in the junior ranks.

Two members of the host club, Bud Kennedy and Bill Bishop topped the field with fine one-under par 70's. They held a two stroke lead over Brian Lewis, who finished three strokes on Riverside's Ted Revey.

Kennedy, a former champion of the tournament, had held here in 1959, was good off the tee Monday. The 26-year-old character accountant hit 12 greens in regulation and took a

total of 28 putts over the sprawling, 6,300-yard layout. He took three birdies and a pair of bogies on the front nine for a one-under 35 and was even par on the back nine. He said after the round that his whole game was going well.

Bishop, one of the province's finest golfers but never a Willingham Cup team member, was close followed by Walter Gow, also of the host club. He finished with a 41 on the front but on top of his game after a slump in tournament play earlier this year.

Playing beautifully into the greens, he hit 15 in regulation and garnered 30 putts on the rear nine. He played near par throughout — 71 in a pair of birdies and a single bogie over 18 holes. At 30 he is the oldest of the leading four shotsmiths.

Lewis and Revey are both in their last year of junior competition and both are 18 years old. Lewis is the younger brother of defending champion Doug Lewis, also of Moncton.

He was one over on the front nine with a 37 and even on the back nine. He finished with a total of 74. Winner of the N.B.-P.E.I. junior championship in 1959, Lewis had four birdies on his round and had his short iron working to perfection.

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Favorite Is Injured

WESTBURY, N.Y. (AP) — Trainer Stanley Dancer reported Monday that Majestic Hanover, early favorite for the \$85,000 estimated Roosevelt Futurity Aug. 1 at Roosevelt Racetrack in Westbury, N.Y., will be out of racing for a year.

Majestic Hanover, owned by The Light Stable of New Egypt, N.J., suffered a chipped bone in his right front knee. Dancer said the injury was discovered when the horse was being ridden by a trainer. He did not know how it occurred.

The \$60,000 yearling purchase, a son of Adios — Magic Counsel, won two Grand Circuit stakes, the Golden Cup at Historic Track, Gothenburg, and the General Sullivan at Monticello, N.Y.

The \$150,000 yearling fee for the Roosevelt Futurity must be posted by Friday, July 20.
