

Saskatchewan Wins First Grey Cup In 29-14 Rout

VANCOUVER (CP) — Saskatchewan Roughriders made their ninth Grey Cup appearance their winning one Saturday. They were down Ottawa Rough Riders for 45 minutes then broke away for a 29-14 victory.

The teams were tied 14-14 at the start of the fourth quarter after a scoreless third period but changed that on the first play when flanker Hugh Campbell outflung Ottawa halfback Joe Poirier for a pass deep in the Ottawa end zone.

From then on it was just a matter of how big the winning margin would be. Prior to Saturday, Saskatchewan was the only professional football club in Canada without a Grey Cup championship.

A total of 32,244 fans turned out in overcast, 48-degree weather and showed early and strong bias in favor of the western Roughriders. Hundreds swarmed over the field to congratulate the winners even before the game had finished and referee Al Dryburgh of Winnipeg had to call the game with four seconds left.

The touchdown pass to Campbell on a second-down play from the Ottawa five was the last of three thrown by quarterback Ron Lancaster, an Ottawa player until he was traded to Saskatchewan in 1963. He hit end Jim Worden with a six-

yard strike in the first quarter and fired a 19-yarder through the outstretched hands of Ottawa halfback Bob O'Billovich to halfback Alan Ford in the second quarter.

Fullback George Reed, who

ground out 133 yards in 23 carries, got the final Saskatchewan touchdown on a 31-yard burst up the middle.

JACKSON THROWS TWO
Ottawa quarterback Russ Jackson had a busy afternoon

trying to evade a strong Saskatchewan rush but still managed to hit flanker Whit Tucker with two long touchdown passes covering 61 and 85 yards.

Guard Jack Abendschan converted all four Saskatchewan touchdowns and Ford added the 29th point on a single. Tackle Bill Cline, got a single on a 51-yard kick.

The five touchdown passes in the game were a Grey Cup record, one more than the previous high of four set in 1946 and tied in 1954.

Lancaster's three passes tied the individual record set by Joe Krol of Toronto Argonauts in 1946 and tied by Sam Elcheverry of Montreal Alouettes in 1954.

Ottawa also got in on the individual records as Tucker's two touchdown receptions tied the mark set in 1954 by Red O'Quinn of Montreal, now Ottawa's general manager. Hal Patterson tied the mark with Montreal Alouettes in 1955 and Ron Howell did it with Hamilton Tiger-Cats in 1958.

Ottawa played a strong game in the first half but a couple of mistakes on which Saskatchewan capitalized kept the score tied and the western Roughriders turned on the power in the final minutes.

Saskatchewan had a total offense of 364 yards with 168 passing — mostly in the first half — and 196 on the ground — mostly in the second half. They ran the ball for only 27 yards in the first 30 minutes while they passed for only 15 in the second half.

Most of Ottawa's 287 yards was picked up in the first half. Sixty of their 92 yards on the ground and 169 of their 195 passing yardage was in the first two quarters.

Rangers Blank Leafs 5-0; Chicago Eases By Boston

NEW YORK (CP) — New York Rangers blanked Toronto Maple Leafs 5-0 Sunday night to complete a weekend sweep against the top two clubs in the National Hockey League. Saturday they whipped first-place Chicago 4-1.

Rugged Reggie Fleming, involved in a first-period scuffle with Toronto defenceman Kent Douglas, scored twice for the Rangers, who moved into a second-place tie with the Leafs.

The goals lifted Fleming's total for the season to seven.

Phil Goyette, Bob Nevin and Vic Hadfield got the other Ranger goals as New York won its third straight for the first time since October, 1963.

The loss snapped a four-game unbeaten string for the Maple Leafs.

Fleming, the league's penalty leader, scored after Hadfield and Nevin had shot the Rangers ahead 2-0.

Ed Giacomin, breezing to his second shutout, handled 23 shots, of which only four were in the second period when the Leafs had manpower advantages three times.

With the game less than two minutes old, Rod Gilbert fed Hadfield in front of Toronto goalie Johnny Bower and Hadfield lifted a backhander into the goal.

There was no further scoring until midway in the second session.

GETS 18TH ASSIST
After the Rangers, checking relentlessly, successfully killed three minor penalties, Nevin converted a Goyette pass. The assist was Goyette's 18th in New York's 18th game.

Less than 1 1/2 minutes later Earl Ingardiel broke up a play in the Toronto end. Boom Boom Geoffrion pounced on the puck and hit Fleming with a centering pass and he beat Bower from 25 feet out.

Fleming's second goal capped a Ranger power play with 3 1/2 minutes remaining in the period.

CHICAGO Eases By Boston

CHICAGO (AP) — Stan Mikita, the National Hockey League's leading scorer, struck for three goals Sunday night in powering Chicago Black Hawks to a 5-1 victory over Boston Bruins.

Mikita scored his ninth goal of the season on a power play early in the first and completed the eighth three-goal performance of his career with a pair in the second period.

Rookie defenceman Ed Van Impe and Wally Boyer scored the other Chicago goals as the Black Hawks boosted their first place lead to three points over Toronto Maple Leafs and New York Rangers.

Mikita, who has 28 points on 11 goals and 17 assists in 16 games, took a pass from Bobby Hull and hit on a 12-foot shot from a sharp angle at 3:14 while Boston's John McKenzie was in the penalty box.
