

# Don Jordan Defeats Moyer To Retain Welter Crown

**PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)** — Don Jordan, constantly boring in, hanged out a unanimous decision over young Denny Moyer of Portland to retain his world welter-weight championship Friday night.

Jordan scored heavily with hooks and uppercuts and had Moyer bleeding from the second round on. By the sixth round it came a question of only whether the 19-year-old challenger could go the distance.

But Moyer pulled up reserve strength in the closing rounds and the bout went without a knockdown.

The closest to a knockdown came in the eighth round when Jordan staggered the hometown challenger with a series of hooks that had Moyer holding on.

In that round, as in several others, the champion from Los Angeles knocked Moyer's mouthpiece out and had blood flowing freely from Moyer's nose and mouth.

Moyer's best weapon against Jordan was a left jab. Occasionally Moyer also sneaked over a right cross but it became apparent early that Moyer did not have the strength to hold off the champion.

Jordan weighed 147 Moyer 146½.

Jordan blocked most of Moyer's sallies but the few occasions when Moyer's punches landed solidly they seemed not even to bother the champion. He was unmarked at the end.

Moyer's face at the end of the bout was lumpy and bloody.

All the officials scored it as a lopsided victory for Jordan. The champion, who said he had a casual acquaintance with Jordan and was interested in the fight, sat 15 rows from the ring and laughed heartily on several occasions as Jordan scored in flurries of hooks and uppercuts.

Walsh.

He is locally bred, being by Argot Pointer, p. 2:07 who came to the Maritimes in 1947, all the way from California and was raced in the stable of J. Harry Breen of Halifax as a three-year-old that year. As a five-year-old, Earl Avery gave him a mark of 2:09 3/5. The dam of Nell's Lad was Nell Chocostade, and she was sired by Hal Dale 2:02 1/4, grand-dam Nell Chocato, by Walter Chocato 2:02 1/4.

Nell Chocostade's first foal was Nell Kalmuck, 2:09 1/5, by the local sire, Kalmuck. She was the leading trotter in the Maritimes for at least one season, and still holds the track trotting record at Saint John Raceway of 2:12 1/5. Great credit is due to owner-trainer-driver Willis for developing Nell's Lad into such a sterling pacer. His record last year was 2:15 1/5.
