Floating Russian Camp 300 Miles From Canada's Arctic Ellesmere Island

NEW YORK (AP)—Pravda says a Russian "high latitude air expedition" is operating in an Arctic area 1,000 miles distant from the continental Soviet Union and only 300 miles away from Canada's Ellesmere Island.
The Soviet airborne scientific mission, the Communist paper says in an article by the top Soviet Arctic chief, V. Burkhavov, is engaged along with other tasks in surveying the region near Soviet Arctic ice station No. 3, now located, according to Pravda, at 86 degrees 3 minutes north and 34 degrees 28 minutes west.
This is within 200 miles of Denmark's Greenland, a little farther from Canadian soil, and about 700 miles from the U. S. air force base at Thule, Greenland.
The Soviet ice expedition No. 3 is one of two the U. S. S. R. has operating currently. A third—expedition No. 5—is being formed.
DRIFTS TOWARD STRAIT
In the last few weeks expedition No. 3 has been drifting in the direction of the narrow strait between Ellesmere Island and Greenland. The Russians had predicted previously it would emerge into the Norwegian sea on the other side of Greenland where they planned to pick it up before the ice floes on which it was located entered the open sea. They are not sure now which side of Greenland it is heading for. They are planning to withdraw part of the personnel by air and leave a skeleton group there until it is clear where the thing is bound to go.
Burkhavov wrote that the U. S. S. R. must have two Arctic ice camps at work regularly—the minimum in view of the great value of meteorological observations from these expeditions, he said.
Pravda also publishes a map which shows that Camp No. 3 travelled through an area claimed by the Canadians as Canadian territory. Canada has taken the view that all of the Arctic directly north of Canadian territory to the North Pole belongs to Canada. The U. S. government does not recognize this claim. Six weeks ago in Ottawa, Canadian officials announced that Soviet publications indicated the Russians had been in an area Canada claims.
The U. S. government has maintained several floating expeditions on ice islands in the Arctic. One of them, abandoned in 1954, is to be reoccupied soon.
Study of the Arctic has intensified in both the U. S. S. R. and the United States because of the possibility the Arctic skies may be the routes of intercontinental bombers in any new world war.
