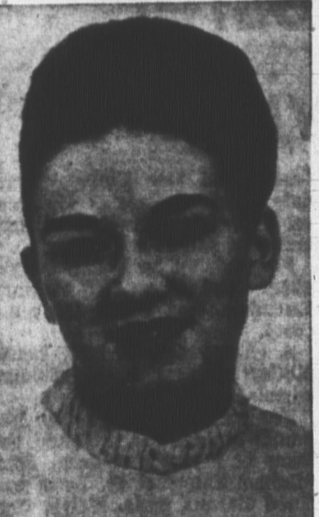

CHICKEN LIVERS SAUTE ON BROILED HAM SLICES
12 chicken livers
¼ tsp. seasoned salt
2 tsp. flour
¼ tsp. butter
¼ tsp. cooking oil
6 thin round slices broiled smoked ham

Onion - apple saute (follows)
Parsley for garnish
Rinse chicken livers with cold water, then drain on paper towels. Mix together seasoned salt and flour; cover the livers with this mixture.

Heat butter and oil in ½ qt. skillet. Add the livers; saute gently until well-browned, turning often. Meatime broil ham and set aside.

To serve: Arrange 2 livers atop each slice of broiled ham; surround with onion - apple saute. Garnish: parsley.

ONION - APPLE SAUTE
2 tsp. butter
1 large Spanish onion, peeled, sliced and medium-chopped
3 c. sliced, peeled apples, or sections drained unsweetened canned pie - apples
1 tsp. salt
¼ cup sugar
Melt butter in 10" frypan;
