VERACIOUS DOG TALE.

Story of a Diamond Ring. At Bow County Court, before Judge French, Q. C., Maud Messent sued as minor, through her father as next friend, claiming damages for false imprisonment from a Mr. and Mrs. Davies, of Somerset road, Wallingford.

Mr. Jones represented the plaintiff and Mr. F. George the defendants.

The case for plaintiff was that until December of last year she had been a servant at defendants' house, when, owing to ill-health, she had to leave.

In April last defendants asked her to assist in spring cleaning walls turning out the spare bedroom she took up the carpet, and under it found the missing ring.

She was told to give it to Mrs. Davies, but she said that lady was sleeping, so she put the ring in her pocket, intending to give it up before she left.

Later on she found that Mrs. Davies had gone out so she left the ring with her, and intending to hand it over the next day.

Unfortunately she was called to her father's house, and forgot that the ring was in her pocket until she happened to wear the same dress on the following Sunday week, when she discovered it in her pocket.

On the Monday morning she put the ring on her finger, in order that she might not forget to return it to Mrs. Davies, whose house was within a few minutes' walk of where she lived, as she was passing on his way to business, as she was outside sweeping the front of the house.

He noticed the diamonds glittering in the sun and came out and spoke to her. After inquiring about her health he remarked that it was a nice ring which she was wearing, and plaintiff replied at once: "Yes, I found it under the carpet; it belongs to Mrs. Davies. Will you give it to her?"

The next day Mrs. Davies called at the house with a detective. Plaintiff was given into custody and taken to Stratford Police Station, where she stopped the night, but not being allowed, The Magistrate committed her for trial, but at the Old Bailey the jury stopped the case, and she was acquitted.

Judge French gave judgment for the plaintiff, with costs, assessing the damages at £25.—London Telegraph.

Sand Sifting Machine. An old four mill device, viz., a suspended sieve with crank motion, as been revived to meet the requirements of a modern factory.

It is well known that no two founders agree as to the right proportions and grading of the materials to suit different forms and sizes of castings, while it is sheer extravagance to allow the skilled moulder to waste his time in riddling when a laborer can do it just as well.

It is to meet this want that a new sand-sifting machine has been devised, and it is that with this machine one laborer can prepare all the facing required by thirty moulds, and be done each day by dinner hour, and be able to fill in his time in the afternoon helping around the factory.

It is maintained that for the purposes of a jobbing foundry, where different grades of facings are necessary a sand sifter is immeasurably superior to the best centrifugal sand mixer. The mixer breaks up and mixes in one grade only, sends lumps of clay, metal droppings, and everything that is passed into the throat, while the sifting machine not only mixes, but sifts all that is thrown in, leaving behind in the riddle box the lumps of clay, scrap, etc., which are not required in the facing.

The machine is equipped with four sieves of sixteen, eight, four and two meshes respectively, which can be changed in a few seconds, either for the purpose of sifting the finest facing or cleaning up the floor of the shop and saving the scrap for the cupola.

The machine occupies a floor space of six feet six inches by four feet six inches. The riddle box is operated at a speed of 20 revolutions per minute, and sifts five cubic yards of moistened sand in forty-five minutes.
