Much credit is due residents of Alberton South for the co-operative effort which made the Alberton boat races a success. Proceeds are in aid of a sorely needed school which was built last year. The old school was shabby and overcrowded to such an extent that the one teacher had to divide her classes, teaching some in the morning and others in the afternoon.

Blueprints for the new two-room school were obtained from the Provincial Government and the building was erected with Mr. Hunter Weeks as head carpenter. The concrete foundation was laid wholly with volunteer labour. The cellar is twenty feet square. The building is 63 by 28 feet, exterior walls being finished with cedar shingles and the roof with green asphalt. The south wall is made up entirely of windows. On the north side of the classrooms are an entry, two cloak rooms, a teacher's room, washroom and four modern sanitary toilets. The classrooms are finished in Douglas fir. There is a four foot baseboard of plywood in natural shade. Walls are painted stratosphere blue. The floor is of green asphalt tile. Heat is supplied by hot air furnaces. Since the first of January teachers and pupils have enjoyed the comfort and convenience of this fine new building which is indeed a credit to the community.
