**Provincial Legislature**  
HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

**The Budget Debate.**

MAY 3.

HON. MR. YEO thought that while the speech of the honorable the Leader of the Government might perhaps satisfy the House, he was doubtful if it would be satisfactory to the country. In the course of his remarks the hon. leader had told the House how difficult it was to prepare estimates which would be strictly correct. He agreed with him in this. But there were several amounts in the estimates for the present year which were much below the sums necessary. The estimate for roads and bridges, for instance, was less than last year; but he thought more was necessary now, as the roads and bridges were in a very bad condition. It was all very well for the Government to talk economy; but when their economy took the direction of starving the public works and the poor school teachers, he thought it was not economy at all. He looked upon the \$20,000 proposed by the Dominion Government as a boon to the Province provided none of our rights were bartered away. With reference to the \$500,000 matter he (Mr. Yeo) said that although the minute of Council was not signed until March last, the leader of the Government and his supporters had said throughout the country during the election last February that the amount was then given to the Province. There was at that time no authority for such a statement. The leader of the Government had stated that hon. members on this side of the House were much elated when they heard the news that the Government did not get the \$500,000. The hon. leader was mistaken. There was no hon. member on this side of the House unpatriotic enough for that. He (Mr. Yeo) was satisfied to know now that there was a reasonable probability of the money being paid. He thought, however, that the correspondence on the subject, if there was any correspondence, should be laid on the table for the information of members of the House. In his speech to-night the hon. leader took great credit for so managing the affairs of the country that taxation was unnecessary. In 1879 the hon. member made a statement in Ludlow Hall that he would not remain the leader of a government which would keep on the Assessment Act. We all know how he kept his word by keeping on the Act several years. The hon. leader refers also to the subject of elections. Perhaps the least said is soonest mended. He thought that although the Opposition were in the minority in the House they represented a majority of votes. The hon. leader takes great credit for our financial position, and claims that the Province is almost a million dollars better off now than it was in 1879. He (Mr. Yeo) thought there would be some difficulty in proving this statement. With reference to the sun paid by Mr. Davies for his services as counsel for the tenants under the Land Purchase Act, he thought that matter had been thoroughly discussed here before; and he had never heard it stated that Mr. Davies had been paid too much for his work. He (Mr. Yeo) did not know how much the delegation to London would cost, but he, however, had seen it stated in the blue books that \$1,500 had been paid on account. The estimates for roads and bridges and education, were not honest, inasmuch as they were less than those of last year, and not sufficient for the purposes for which they were voted. He had noticed also that there was nothing in the estimates for a Jubilee celebration, but he thought, perhaps, the leader of the Government intended bringing down supplementary estimates. The Government took great credit for keeping the financial position of the Province in such good condition. But what are the facts? After being nine years in power and getting windfalls from Ottawa and keeping on the Assessment Act we find the Province nearly \$200,000 in debt. This state of affairs, so far as he could see, did not show good management or economy. He could not give credit to the Government for economy, and thought they were not entitled to support because they had deceived the people. Mr. FARQUHARSON considered the budget speech weak, but it was perhaps as strong as it could be made. Much had been covered up; it was not a true and honest statement of the affairs of the Province. When the present Government came into power they were handed \$40,000 by the then Provincial Treasurer. They promised to make ends meet without resorting to direct taxation. How did they keep this promise? By continuing the Assessment Act for three years and collecting about \$80,000 from the people. The Government with the country to understand that they are entitled to great credit for obtaining the pier's money, but he (Mr. F.) thought they made a great mistake when they took this money from the Dominion Government. They neglected the wharves and spent the money on roads and bridges. The Leader of the Government said last session there would probably be a small surplus at the end of the year. The Opposition said there would not be a surplus. Instead of the small surplus predicted we find a debt of about \$193,000. The Leader of the Government says the *Pobol's* statements with reference to the \$500,000 matter were false. He (Mr. F.) said they were true. We have proof that the people were told the money had been given when such was not the case. He thought we should know what the delegation to England cost. In the face of the fact that the cost of education is increasing each year, we find that this year's estimate for educational purposes is \$1,000,000. He thought that was a very large sum.

that of last year. This should, he thought, be explained. The estimates for roads and bridges are also short of last year's estimate, notwithstanding the fact that greater repairs and improvements are necessary. After eulogizing the Legislative Council for its watchfulness in looking after the rights of the people, by throwing out the Subway bill and the amendment to the Education Act, he proceeded to discuss the course which should be pursued in view of the large Provincial debt, claiming that the salaries of the heads of departments and of members of the House should be cut down. He said the Opposition would favor such a proceeding. He was also of opinion that something should be done about keeping the wharves in repair until such time as the Dominion Government should take them over. After some further remarks concerning what he considered the reckless statements of the Government he resumed his seat.

House then went into committee of supply. Mr. John McLean in the chair.

The estimates were discussed by Hon. Messrs. Sullivan, Ferguson, Yeo, Sutherland, Bell, Shaw and others.

House adjourned.

**Our Game Laws.**

Sir,—It is a notorious fact that our game laws are the most lame and arbitrary that a legislature could conceive. We have only a very few island birds, and they should be protected. We have been bunting about the matter long enough. Some time ago Mr. Bain, North River, delivered a lecture brimful of interesting facts in regard to our island birds. It is to be hoped that sufficient interest has been awakened among our public men to induce them to take action in this matter.

It is well known that every fall "pot hunters" make deadly havoc among the few remaining flocks of partridges; and it is desirable that this interesting and toothsome bird should have better protection. We know one or two private gentlemen who have shown some interest in this matter, and beyond their expectations have succeeded in raising chickens of great beauty and plumpness. Those on the Island now are evidently a cross of the moor-fowl; and possibly we could have them further crossed by the Langshans or Plymouth Rock fowl, breeds noted for size and excellence for table use. It is a subject worthy of favorable consideration, and the example set should be followed by further experiments. We trust the fish and game protection society will take this matter up.
