

# Air Force And Angels Win Softball Series Opener

The R.C.A.F. Royals and the Guardian Angels won the opening games of the City Softball League quarter final play-offs yesterday by defeating the Basilica Youth Club and the Sunshine Island Dairy.

The Air Force won a 9-5 decision over the B.Y.C. on the Old Diamond while the Angels defeated the Dairy-men 14-7 in a game on the Parkdale Diamond.

Ross Armstrong hurled the air-men to their win as he tossed a nine-hitter at the B.Y.C. Playing coach Wally Shephard of the B.Y.C. pitched a neat five-hitter for the losers.

Armstrong struck out eleven batters and walked only two while Shephard whiffed ten and issued four walks. The B.Y.C. committed five errors and the air-men two.

The Air Force scored two runs in the first inning and added four more in the third to run up a winning margin. The B.Y.C. came on strong in the late inning with two runs in the seventh and two in the ninth.

John Sifton led the Air Force batters with a double and single while Harold Wood punched out two hits.

Catcher Kenny Tulle, first baseman Alf Coady and Shortstop Charlie Weatherbie each got two hits for the B.Y.C. Len Arsenault of the B.Y.C. connected for the only home run as he poled a two-run four master in the ninth.

The B.Y.C. pulled off one snappy double play, a John Walsh to Len Arsenault to Alf Coady relay in the sixth.

Big Henry Hartinger pitched the Angels to their win over the Dairy-men with a steady hurling performance. Hartinger gave up 12 hits, nine of them singles and kept them well scattered.

Hockley players "Rocke" Richards, Elmer Lach, Turk Broda and Tedder Kennedy are among the stars scheduled to sparkle golf interest during the first part of the week. At two o'clock this afternoon Lach and Richard will tee off in competition with Broda and Kennedy. The Canadians will play the Leafs for "The National Hockey League Golf Championship."

Golfers Bob Gray and Art MacKenzie of Charlottetown will be leaving here today or tomorrow to play with the N.B.-P.E.I. team in the Willingdon Cup competitions. The other members of the two-province team are Tommy Stewart of St. Croix, N. B. and Pete Kelly of Fredericton. Gray, MacKenzie and Stewart were picked for the team upon the completion of the N.B.-P.E.I. meet here last month while Kelly won his berth on the team in a play-off with R. F. Morrison of Moncton at Saint John last week.

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# Victoria Marksman Wins Gov.-General's Medal

SOUTH MARCH, Ont. (CP)—A 36-year-old Victoria marksman who has never won any major prize at the Dominion Rifle Association shoot Saturday carried off the coveted Governor-General's Gold Medal at the finish of the 85th annual meet.

Lt. Hugh Thorburn of the Canadian Scottish Regiment Rifle Association, coming here for the last nine years, posted a score of 191 of a possible 200 to beat 299 other competitors.

The British Columbia marksman placed 170th in the qualifying stage of the meet.

His winning score in the final stage was one better than Sgt. E. C. Armstrong of Ottawa and Camp Borden, Ont., both carding 190's.

Lt.-Col. Steve Johnson of Calgary, who placed first in the qualifying stage, finished with 189. Last year's winner, Lt. Col. Des-

mond Burke of Lansing, Ont., posted 180.

Sharing some of the spotlight with Lt. Thorburn was Sqdn. Ldr. Dave Reynolds, 45 of Ottawa, a member of air material command at RCAF station Rockcliffe, who finished first in the Bisley aggregate to qualify for a spot on Canada's 1954 Bisley team.

Top aggregate standings of matches held during the week-long meet are added to the scores posted in the final stage of the Governor-General's match and from this comes Canada's Bisley team.

Sqdn. Ldr. Reynolds finished with 839 points, one more than Lt. Thorburn.

The top 18 in the Bisley aggregate qualify to make the trip to England.

In the only other match fired Saturday, Lt.-Col. B. D. Shaw of Nottingham, Eng., a member of Britain's Cambridge University Rifle Association, won the 1,000 yard Alexander of Tunis event.

He posted a 49 of a possible 60, firing 10 rounds from the 1,000 yard range.

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# Rain Halts Play In Junior Tennis Tourney

OTTAWA, (CP)—Rain halted play for nearly two hours Sunday in the Canadian junior tennis championships.

The showers chased 68 players battling for doubles honors from the 17 courts of the Rideau Lawn Tennis Club shortly after matches were started on the third day of the fifth annual event.

Play continued later in the junior men's and women's doubles and boys' doubles. The doubles were the only matches carded for Sunday, with only one singles played.

John MacLean of Buffalo defeated Lucien Richer of Montreal 6-0, 6-1 in a junior men's singles match. The other singles matches will be resumed today.

The favorite Canadian in the junior men's singles, Pierre Lambert of Victoriaville, Que., advanced to the second round Saturday. Lambert, the Ontario junior men's singles champion, beat Don Hiegher of Ottawa 6-1, 6-4.

Seen Sure Bet  
Lambert is picked as a sure bet to win the Canadian junior men's closed singles—an event started this year to give domestic players a chance to win the title without American competition. The Americans, backed by more tournament experience, have nabbed the hon-

ors in previous years. The men's defending champion Stephen Gottlieb of New York City, won't be in the title hunt this year, but U. S. player still are favored to win the open.

Kalman (Buzzy) Hettlerman, an 18-year-old from Baltimore, Md., is picked to win Gottlieb's title. The husky dark-haired youngster is first seeded American in the event. He moved to the second rung Saturday by trimming David Livingston of Ottawa.

Hettlerman was semi-finalist in the U.S. national and is the junior men's singles and boys' singles champion of Maryland. He also won the Middle-Atlantic junior men's title.

Seeking Third Win  
Mariette LaFromboise, the husky blonde from Montreal, who won the junior women's singles twice in a row, will be back to try for a third win.

The all-Canadian team competitions were played the first day of the week-long tourney, carded and sparked by Lambert, retained the men's title by defeating Ontario 3-2 in the semi-final and Nova Scotia 3-0 in the final. Nova Scotia won the women's championship by ousting Ontario 3-1 in the final after beating Quebec 3-0 in the semi-final.
