OTTAWA, Nov. 29 — (Special) — Parliament on Monday enters the third week of the long-drawn out debate on the Draft Address. To date only one member from the Island Province, J. Angus MacLean, Conservative member for Queen's, has taken part.

WEDNESDAY

At a meeting of the Potato Marketing Board held yesterday the present position regarding the movement of this year's potato crop was reviewed and Board members were surprised to learn that already upwards of 5,000 carloads of potatoes had been shipped by rail, water and truck or are already assembled at Island ports and local storages awaiting shipment.

"This movement breaks all records from this Province for a similar period of time," states Mr. D. A. MacDonald, chairman of the Board.

Seventeen Islanders were among the home-Christmas draft of Canadian Army personnel which landed at Halifax last evening from the S.S. "Neptunia". Thirty-five officers and 700 men, all members of the 27th Canadian Infantry Brigade, are included in the draft.

The men are scheduled to board trains carrying them to home destinations across Canada today. All have served in Germany from one to two years with the 27th Brigade. Leave has been granted on the basis of reporting to their respective depots on January 4, 1954.

Work which has been in progress at the Summerside office of the P. E. I. Telephone Company since the first of July of this year to install equipment for the speeding up of long distance calls between Summerside and Charlottetown has now been completed and the installation of the complicated equipment now makes it possible for the operator in Summerside to dial direct the required number in Charlottetown, without putting the call through the Charlottetown operator. This means, not only a great speeding up of the service to the general public, but also to the users of teletype service in this Province.

As a part of its advertising policy the Potato Marketing Board this year decided to put on a display at the Prince Edward Island potatoes, both seed and tablestock, at the Royal Winter Fair, Toronto. For this purpose a number of 50 lb., 15 lb., and 10 lb. lots of paper bags were assembled and shipped to Toronto. In addition to this were several 75 lb. sacks of tablestock as well as samples of Foundation stock of the following varieties—Green Mountain, Irish Wonder, St. Hubert, Canso, Pontiac, Warba, Katahdin. The paper sacks were arranged on stands so that the various brands were in full view of the public whereas the seed was placed in open trays on a long table. Other features included photographs of potato fields and a few Island scenes to lend color and interest to the general set up of the booth. This 15 feet by 3 feet containing 6-inch block letters in blue on a white background containing the words: "Prince Edward Island, Canada's Garden Province, Specializing in High Class Seed and Table Potatoes."

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fur ranchers are putting up a strenuous campaign in an endeavor to have the United States government to reduce the heavy excise tax placed on furs. If they are successful it is probable that Canada may follow suit. The government tax is so heavy that it interferes greatly with the promotion of fur garments.

A collection of Canadian made fur garments was shown in Cuba November 29. It was the first combined promotion for Canadian furs in that market. Six Montreal and Toronto manufacturers contributed thirty garments in mutation and standard mink, squirrel, heaver and otter. Canadian mink breeders are supporting this promotion. Miss Canada Mink (Jeannine Patenaude, a Montreal model) along with Miss Stockholm and Miss Miami Beach, are to model the garments.

Oelo, Norway's first auction will open next Monday, December 7 with an offering of 5000 Norwegian blue fox and 6000 silver and platinum fox. Mink will be offered December 10 and 11th with a collection of approximately 35,000 standard mink, 5,000 platinum and 5,000 pastel. The auction house notes that Norway's production of mutations is about 60,000 pelts, the biggest in Scandinavia.

Mr. Callbeck also ranched foxes on his own and from these developed many prize winners. At the first silver fox show held in Montreal in 1920 some of the top specimens exhibited were bred by him and one of them, winner of the light silver championship, was sold for a long price to the Borestone Fox Company of Maine and became famous as a progenitor. Mr. Callbeck was also one of the prime movers of the Fur Sales Board and a director of the Silver Black Fox Breeders' Association of Prince Edward Island. In both of these organizations his good judgment was greatly relied upon. He had attained the good age of 87 and passed away respected in the Province and leaving behind him an honored name that will be treasured by his descendants.
