Notice of Trial Served In Potato Damages Suit

-Mr. Murdoch Dawson of Albany yesterday completed the legal steps necessary to serving the Potato Marketing Board with a notice of trial in a suit for damages to an amount in the vicinity of \$23,000.00.
In the action Mr. Dawson alleges there was mismanagement on the part of board officials in setting prices in the spring of 1933 that could not be obtained on the open market, and that by holding minimum prices above market prices he was prevented from selling approximately 23 carloads of seed and tablestock potatoes.
Mr. Dawson also alleges that the board later made orders on prices retroactive to protect some dealers and shippers that he claims had sold below the board price.
Mr. Dawson is represented by E. H. Strong, Q.C., and K. M. Martin, Q.C., in the suit for damages which will come before the June term of the Supreme Court. -S.

S'side Council Approves Payment Of \$35,000 For Stadium Construction

-After lively discussion, a special meeting of the Summerside Town Council last evening approved the payment of \$35,000.00 to the directors of the Summerside Trotting Association in accordance with the terms of an agreement drawn up before construction on the Raceway Stadium had started.
According to this agreement the town borrowed \$65,000.00 from the Provincial Government which they re-leased to the directors of the Summerside Trotting Association in two payments made in November and December for the construction of the Raceway Stadium. This money, secured by a first mortgage on the building, is to be repaid in equal amounts each year over a ten-year period.
A further part of this agreement stated that \$35,000.00 would be paid after January 1st when construction was nearing completion, and when the directors could show the council bills had been paid to the amount of \$80,000.00, and an additional \$15,000.00 would be paid by the town to the directors during the installation of an artificial ice plant scheduled to be installed this summer.
For these last two payments totalling \$50,000.00 the town is to receive shares of common stock.
According to the understanding, the directors were to have an equity of \$25,000.00 invested in the building.
Because Coun. Andrew Perry is associated with the company, Mayor Wedge suggested he would not be taking part in the discussion and called on him to take the chair, after explanation had been made regarding the purpose of the meeting.
After a letter had been read from Mr. Harold Gaudet, president of the Summerside Trotting Association, requesting immediate payment of the \$35,000.00, the Mayor asked the town clerk Mr. Jack Cameron to provide the council with the information available concerning the expenditures made by the rink directors, and accordingly cancelled checks and receipts totalling \$94,000.00 were shown to councillors.
Following a motion by Mayor Wedge, seconded by Councillor Clarence Steele, that payment of the \$35,000.00 be made at this time, different expressions of opinion were heard on the matter.
Councillors Dr. H. E. Clark and James MacDougall stated it had been their understanding of the agreement that the directors were to maintain an equity of \$25,000.00 in the stadium at all times during construction, and that the council was now, in effect, being asked to give the directors a total of \$129,000.00 while the president, Mr. H. E. Gaudet, had placed paid bills before them for the amount of only \$94,000.00.
Mayor Wedge stated that Mr. Gaudet maintained he was obliged to show them paid bills to the amount of only \$90,000.00, and while he had shown Mayor Wedge

figures of construction costs which totalled approximately \$124,000.00, Mr. Gaudet refused to show these figures in detail to the whole council on the grounds that the agreement did not require him to do so.
Councillor James MacDougall said that the town in making \$100,000.00 available for construction of the Stadium was into big business, and that as such, there was no reason why the Council should hesitate to ask the Stadium directors to show expenditures amounting to \$125,000.00—made up of the \$100,000.00 from the town, and the equity of \$25,000.00 invested by the directors.
Councillor Perry, speaking from the chair, replied that if there was any doubt on this matter suggesting that the directors had not lived up to the agreement, the directors would turn in the keys of the Stadium to the town which holds the first mortgage on the building.
According to Agreement
Councillor Lidstone stated that from his point of view the building had been constructed according to the agreement and that it was now a question of whether the Council would abide by their agreement and make the payment promised.
Councillor Clark said that the money provided by the Council was money being administered by the Council on behalf of the people, and that his understanding of the agreement was that the equity of the directors should at all times be equal to \$25,000.00 during construction, and wondered if the majority of councillors felt this should be reduced.
Councillor MacDougall stated that he understood the money was to be used in building construction and questioned items of equipment such as nets, stoves, ice scrapers, drink cooler, etc., shown to Mayor Wedge by Mr. Gaudet as part of construction costs.
Mayor Wedge said he felt that these should be considered as building expenses because they were all capital expenditures.
He said he regretted this meeting had been made necessary as he believed the agreement was being completed satisfactorily, and that the rink was one of which to be proud.
Councillor Clark said his opinions as expressed did not mean he was not also proud of the new Stadium. He said that the figures shown to Mayor Wedge by Mr. Gaudet during the day had brought the total expenditure up much higher than those Mr. Gaudet had made available to an earlier meeting of the Council, and that his concern in the matter placed him in the position of wanting to do not only the right thing by the directors, but also to do the right thing for the people the council represents.
All councillors were present at the meeting with the exception of Councillor W. E. Jenkins, who was out of town on business.
Some of the figures made public at the meeting revealed that the construction contract of M. F. Schurman Company Ltd., amounted to \$51,930.00 while the bill for steel purchased from the Robb Engineering Company amounted to \$32,500.00.-S.
