mobile. Advanced safety features include new Total Contact brakes, safety-rim wheels, 14-inch low-pressure tires, and optional seat belts. Dodge is offering in 1957 a complete line of 18 body styles in Crusader, Regent and Custom Royal models as well as the Mayfair line shown here.

"The 1957 Dodge represents an outstanding example of designers and engineers working in the closest kind of harmony," says Howard Rosebrugh, General Sales Manager of the Dodge-DeSoto Division of Chrysler Corporation of Canada, Limited. The new cars will be introduced this week to the Canadian public in dealer showrooms all across the country.

The complete Dodge line includes five body series: Custom Royal, Mayfair, Regent, Crusader and Suburban. Common to all body models is a new interpretation of Flight-Sweep styling, the new shape of motion, which this year features a strikingly lowered silhouette that sweeps gracefully back to up-thrusting tail fins to give a look of speed and agility. The wheelbase has been enlarged to 122 inches on Suburban models and 118 inches on Crusader, Regent and Mayfair models. The front end treatment incorporates a brand new styling trend in the "twin light" arrangement of the headlights and parking lights.

This year Dodge offers a triumph of engineering research in its Torsion-Aire Ride. Chrysler products, already world famous for their riding qualities, will again be far ahead of competition through this new combination of front torsion-bar suspension and a new rear suspension arrangement. The new suspension system uses two torsion-bar springs - one for each front wheel. Mounted horizontally, they replace the big vertical drive which offers greater flexibility of operation, improved engine braking, and greater break-away acceleration. It offers, too, a new advancement in its "N" or neutral button starting. With the ignition engaged, a slight pressure on the "N" button both disengages the transmission and starts the engine. Torque-Flite is available on Mayfair and sport suburban models, while Power-Flite automatic is available on all other models.

The 1957 Dodge has newly designed ball joints replacing all kingpins, reducing steering effort and quickening wheel return after cornering.

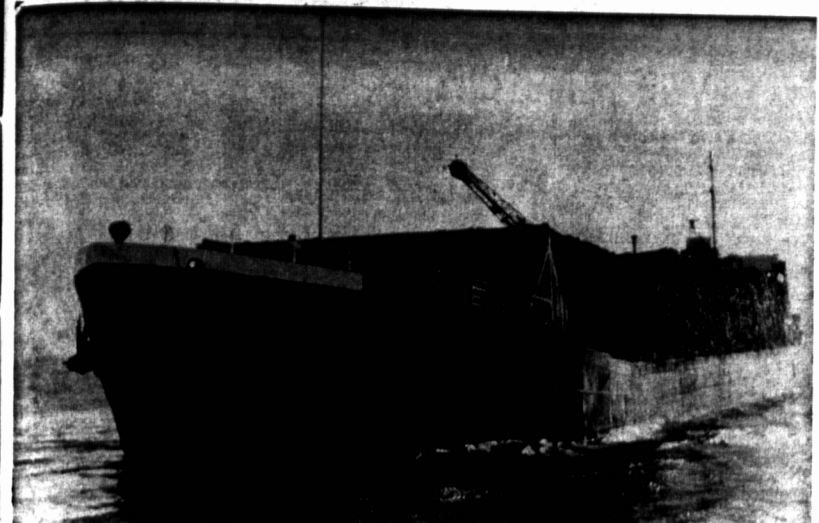
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**LAST LOAD OF PULP FOR SEASON**

The above photo shows the M.V. Robert Mac Michael taking on its last load of pulp for the fall season at Montague. The ship was loaded for the Anglo Pulp and Paper Mills, Ltd. of Quebec City by Boates (P.E.I.) Ltd. under the direction of James Hornby.

This expanding Island industry is leaving considerable money with the local producers. The boat carrying a load of 1,300 cords at a cost of approximately \$25,000 to the purchaser as well as some \$5,000 to truckers and handlers.

Montague and Georgetown are the only ports in this area which are used for loading pulp, as it must be hauled by truck from the Wood Island section, the harbor there being too shallow to accommodate these vessels.
