

Senator Brown's Murderer.

FOUND GUILTY AND SENTENCED TO BE HANGED.

Bennet alias Dickson was tried in Toronto on the 22nd, for the murder of the late Hon. George Brown and found guilty. The jury were out three hours and returned with a verdict of guilty just before 11 p. m. Bennet was sentenced to be hanged on the 23rd of July, and vouchsafed no reply, except to tell the Judge that he would have been better pleased had the interval been made shorter. Mr. Brown left no ante-mortem statement, and his account of the shooting could not be used, as it was not given in the prisoner's hearing. The verdict was based on circumstantial evidence and on contents of papers found on him when he was arrested. The verdict gives general satisfaction and the sentence is sure to be carried out. The prisoner was ably defended and has had a fair trial.

Moral Treatment of Dogs.

He is pained by ingratitude, delighted when notice is taken of him, sensible to ridicule, and rendered, for the time being, quite wretched when his well meant advances are repulsed by scolding or unkindness. You will do well to remember these things in your intercourse with him. But I must give you the shady side of a dog's character as well as the sunny, or my picture would be far from complete. Well, then, there are times when a dog, either from a little fit of naughtiness coming over him, or from sheer love of fun and mischief—and a dog's fun often is mischievous—is guilty of faults. In this case how are we to act? To pass a fault over is folly; to beat him for it were bad policy, not to say crime. No, the best plan is to reason with him, show him where he has done wrong, scold him if need be, but do not lose your temper; your anger he can bear, but, presuming that he loves you, he cannot endure to see you vexed, and after you have lectured him his ludicrous capers and romps and his kisses are all meant too woo back to your face the smiles that his thoughtless conduct was the means of banishing.

ACTIVITY IN THE SUGAR MARKET.

Montreal, June 19.—There has been an active enquiry for refined sugars during the past few days, resulting in a large business and a further advance in prices. Yesterday refiners put up their figures ½c in the morning, and another ½c in the afternoon, to meet the increasing demand. The sales during the past week have amounted to about 1,200 to 1,500 barrels a day. Raw sugars have sympathized in the advance. About 2,009 hhd. raw are offering on this market at 7½-7c for grocery grades. In New York, granulated was quoted at 10½c to-day, which under the old tariff would make the price now about ½c higher than Redpath's present quotations for a similar grade. Yesterday's report of the New York market says: "Refined have been in quick, sharp demand, and on both soft and hard hard sugars the supply is about all exhausted. Prices show still another advance, and are very strong at the improvement. In raw sugars, so far as shown, business is very good, and with the steady addition to the cost of refined, values for raw are very stiff. In a few cases a fractional advance over former figures is named, but it does not appear to have been positively established."—Gazette.

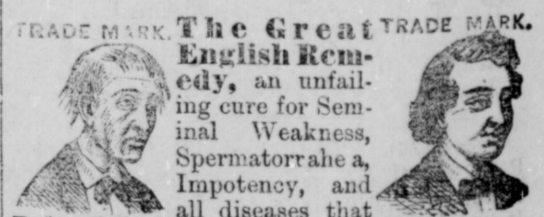
