ON TO LADYSMITH

Gen. Buller Marches in that Direction

AFTER CROSSING TUGELA AND OUTFLANKING BOERS.

Force of Cavalry Watching Pritchard's Drift.

The Boers still Constructing Trenches and Defensive Works—A Message from Ladysmith—The Garrison cheered by hearing Buller's Guns—Are ready for the Boers if they Contemplate Another Attack—Joubert Seriously Injured.

SPECIAL DESPATCH TO THE EXAMINER.

BULLER CROSSES THE TUGELA.

LONDON, Feb. 5.—It is now definitely known that General Buller has crossed the Tugela River further north than before, and that he succeeded in outflanking the Boers, leaving the enemy on his right.

DURBAN, Feb. 5.—General Buller crossed the Tugela River on Friday night and is now marching on to Ladysmith. No definite news regarding the result of his latest movement will be allowed to go out for publication until Ladysmith is relieved.

A MESSAGE FROM LADYSMITH.

The following message was received from Ladysmith by heliograph, on Feb. 4: "The garrison were much cheered at hearing General Buller's guns yesterday. The result of the engagement is not known. The Boers are again massing guns near Ladysmith and are also moving another towards Surprise Hill. We are quite ready for them if they contemplate another attack."

AFTER SPION KOP.

DURBAN, Feb. 5.—General Buller personally supervised the retirement of his army across the Tugela River after the action of Spion Kop. Then he returned to his old headquarters at Spearman's camp looking much fagged but impassive.

CHANGES IN STAFF.

LONDON, Feb. 5.—The following despatch, is from Spearman's Camp, dated January 29. "There has been a re-arrangement of the staffs of Generals Buller and Warren. General Wynne has taken over the command of General Woodgate's brigade, and Colonel Miles is now chief of staff."

WATCHING PRITCHARD'S DRIFT.

A force of British cavalry with guns is watching Pritchard's drift, but the Boers are keeping very quiet. Little doubt exists that the enemy were abandoning the whole of Spion Kop position when our retirement induced them to return. There was slight firing at the Boers from the naval guns, near Swartz Kop today. The enemy are still constructing trenches and defensive works opposite Potgieter's drift.

WHAT BOERS ARE FED ON.

MODDER RIVER, Feb. 5.—The Landrost at New Bishop read publicly on Jan 26th the following telegram which he said he had just received: Lord Roberts is a prisoner, and General Buller has been killed. Nine thousand British have been

killed and seven thousand captured. The British lost 48 guns last Saturday.

THE ROAD TO LADYSMITH.

LONDON, Feb. 5.—The Daily Mail has the following from Pietermaritzburg, dated Feb. 4: General Buller has undoubtedly secured the road to Ladysmith, and should reach his objective point this week.

NOT KILLED THIS TIME.

LONDON, Feb. 5.—General Joubert was seriously injured by a shell at Willow Grange fight near Estcourt. The shell overturned him and his horse and the shock was so great that Joubert will never be able to command on horseback again.

LACK OF OFFICIAL NEWS.

No official statement has however been issued and at present nothing can be said with certainty in reference to the situation.

It is noteworthy, in view of the great delay, press messages have as a rule been subject to silence the outbreak of the war that unofficial despatches sent from Ladysmith yesterday appear in this morning's newspapers.

THE HUGHES-HUTTON CASE.

OTTAWA, Feb. 5.—The Free Press says it is understood that the breach between Major General Hutton and Lieut. Col. Sam Hughes has been bridged and that Colonel Hughes will be nominated to a position in Strathcona's Horse.

The curious fact is that this announcement is made immediately after Sir McKenzie Bowell's intimation that he will move for correspondence relating to the dispute.

FIRING OF HEAVY GUNS HEARD.

LONDON, Feb. 5.—6 a. m.—Conflicting reports are published this morning with regard to Buller's movements, but on the whole it would seem that his third attempt to advance on Ladysmith has actually commenced. The firing of heavy guns was heard by the beleaguered garrison throughout Saturday.

One report indicates that fighting has occurred at Coleenso, while news has reached Ladysmith by some means that a brigade of Buller's army has crossed the Tugela.

PLANNING ANOTHER MESSACRE

Turks Preparing to Exterminate the Armenians.

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—A World special says: "Fears have been repeatedly expressed during the last three months that the turks are planning another general massacre of the Christians. In the interior of Turkey. The Kurds, particularly in Kurdistan, are much excited, and it needs only a spark to start them upon their awful work."

The World has information which indicates that at Mardin, Bitlis, Derbekr and Harpoot, the principal cities of Central and Eastern Turkey, the Mussulmans are only waiting a favorable opportunity to repeat their horrible work of rapine and murder of the fall of 1895 and the spring of 1896. At Harpoot, the Armenians live in a constant state of terror, and this is true of many of the other cities of Asiatic Turkey. Turks threaten the Armenians openly in the market place and tell them they have but a short time to live. They are repeatedly told by their Turkish neighbors that there is to be another massacre, and that when it comes it will be one of complete extermination. The central government takes no steps to counteract this impression."
