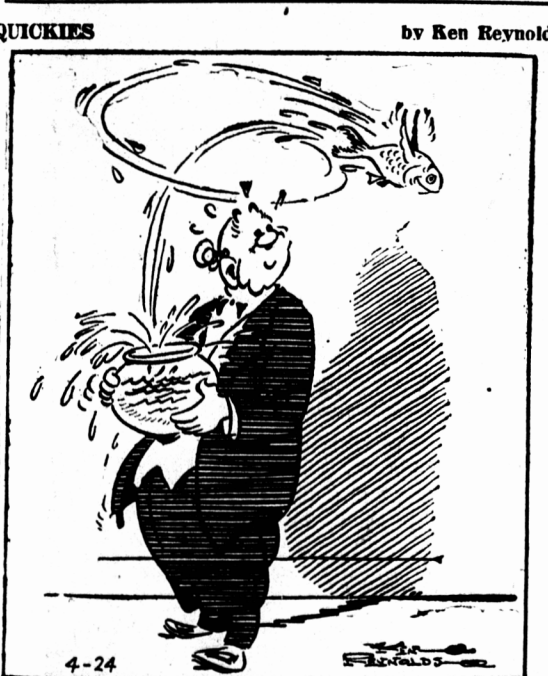

### U. S. Seeks Interest In Belgian Congo Uranium Mines

LONDON, April 27 — (CP) — A financial source said the week the Bank of England is negotiating a stock deal giving the United States an interest in the Belgian Congo uranium mines.

Spokesmen for the Bank, the Treasury, and both British and American interests involved refused to confirm or deny the deal, but they admitted that a question on the matter will go before the House of Commons in a few days.

The deal, if carried through, would also give American interests a big share in control of the vital Benguela Railway which moves the precious ore from Africa's heart on the first leg of its journey to American A-bomb plants.

If the reported deal matures, the bank would sell about 1,600,000 shares of stock in "Tanganyika concessions" to a financial group with strong American participation.

The group is said to be headed by the Anglo-American Corporation, a widely-known mining finance house controlled by the fabulously wealthy British-South African financier, Sir Ernest Oppenheimer.

William Lincoln Honold of San Francisco, wealthy mining engineer, is a permanent director of the Anglo-American Corporation and some London financial circles put American participation in the firm as high as 50 per cent.

Tanganyika concessions own 80 per cent of the capital of the Benguela Railway and 14 per cent of the stock in Union Miniere du Haut Katanga — the firm that works the vital uranium and copper mines in the Belgian Congo.

The Portuguese Government holds the 10-per-cent balance of the railway's shares.

The Bank of England acquired the "Tanganyika" shares from the French Government under the 1946 Anglo-French payments agreement.

### Eggs and Poultry

Egg production on Prince Edward Island is increasing rapidly. The quality has improved and although the demand is not so strong, dealers are keeping floors clean. It appears that shortly over domestic needs and dealers are planning culling operations with the intention of storing eggs.

Paying prices for eggs weakened slightly during the week and operators of grading stations are quoting producers for ungraded eggs AL 31-32, AM 29-30, AP 23-24, B 26-27, C 18-19.

**Dairying**

The official report from the Nova Scotia Creamery Association under date of April 21st states Factory Price 65c Wholesale for one and two pound prints f.o.b. Halifax. Local Jobbing 65c.

On April 21st Montreal butter was quoted at 58 1-4c for No. 1 Solids with Toronto butter 57 1-2c-58c for No. 1 Solids delivered Toronto.

Creamery butter quotations remained essentially the same during the past week on most markets in New Brunswick but lately, however, there are slight signs of weakness showing. In anticipation of lower prices at the end of the month all distributors of butter are endeavoring to avoid any accumulation of that product and the same may be said of the other two Maritime Provinces, Nova Scotia, and Prince Edward Island.

Some reduction in price might occur at any time and since the announcement has been received from Ottawa that a five cent lowering in price is to take place on the first of May extreme caution in buying is very prevalent. Quotations of last week, however, still hold good on the New Brunswick market under date of April 21st with creameries to wholesalers, one and two pound flats, 62 1-2c. Wholesalers to retail stores, one and two pound flats, 64c.

**Slow Movement**

In Prince Edward Island most creamery salesmen contacted within the last eight or ten days report a slow movement in butter. They understand that extreme caution exists among purchasers for this product in anticipation of the lowering of the floor price, although it has been announced by Ottawa that purchasers of Dairy Products Board butter having a

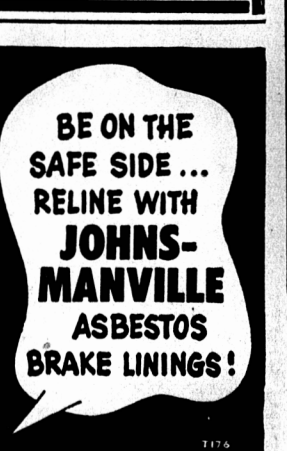
