

Simon Predicts Six Round Knock-out Over Dick Hall

Hard hitting Gary Simon, his eyes of training almost completely shut, predicted a six round knock-out over Dick Hall of Boston in their fight at the Sports Club on Thursday night.

In a telephone conversation last night, Simon reported he had a full data on Hall "who fights the kind of fight I like." "I like those fellows who open up and fight," said Simon. "They

give you a good target and I feel that about the sixth round I will put him away for the night."

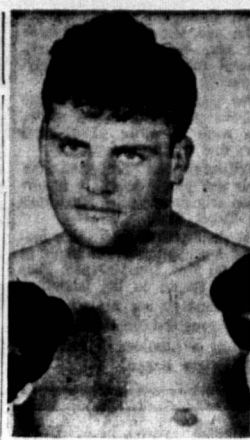
It was also learned over the weekend that popular Roy "Tiger" Steele, who has taken up residence in New Glasgow will be returning to the island for a six round bout with Tony Veronis of Boston.

Veronis is an outstanding professional fighter with a record of 20 straight victories and is a ten round fighter. He recently defeated Keith Paris, the Maritime Welterweight champion in Halifax. Steele has been seeking a little scrap with Paris and his manager, Henry Filinger, has arranged this fight with Veronis to see if the former City boxer can stand the acid test.

Gary Simon was in an unusually talkative mood last night. He referred to the winner take-all terms of the fight and he let it be known that he didn't intend to let Dick Hall become a rich man at his expense.

"I can beat Dick Hall and he knows it," stated Simon. "It was Hall who wanted the return clause in the contract. McCluskey gave Hall trouble when he stayed on top of him. Well that's just the way I fight and when I step in there Thursday night Mr. Hall will think there are ten Simons in the ring."

Asked about his record Simon stated that he has had 22 professional fights with 11 wins, ten losses and a draw. He has never been knocked out but was stopped once with a cut eye in the fourth round against Charlie Chase while fighting for the Canadian Middleweight Cham-

ampionship.

In his last seven fights he knocked out Billy Mays in one round, Vern Stevenson in eight rounds, Eloi Durelle in seven rounds, Doug Odo in seven, a draw with Cobey McCluskey and lost a decision to the former Welterweight champion of Italy Giampaolo Melis.

The fight with Melis was a great prestige builder for Melis as he fought such outstanding boxers as Vince Martinez, Yama Bahama Danny Gioveanelli and Chico Vejar.

In addition to the rounder between Simon and Hall and six rounder between Steele and Veronis there will be a ten rounder between Don Trainer and Andrew Gonzales of Havana, Cuba Leo "Whipper" Steele and Mario Rodrigues of New Bedford, Mass. Henry Filinger, Manager of Roy Steele admits the Veronis fight is a tough one for his boy but he feels that if Steele can stand up to Veronis he deserves a title shot at Paris.

What Boxing Book Says Is True In Ch'ship Fight

SEATTLE (AP) — The good book of boxing says that no good amateur can beat a good professional. So today, newly written in the book is the registry:

On the night of Aug. 22 Thomas Peter Rademacher, 28, the 1956 Olympic games champion, in his first start as a professional, was knocked out in six rounds by the pro champion of the world, Floyd Patterson.

Inscribed also were the facts that Rademacher in his rash and rash attempt to do the impossible was gallant and game, awkward and wild, dangerous and strong — and he grew woefully tired after three rounds.

Seven times the big fellow visited the floor of the ring over the pitcher's mound in Sicks' Stadium.

The seventh time, after 2:57 of the sixth he failed to get up at the count of 10 by referee Tommy Loughran.

Rademacher's one big moment came in the second. He can say to his grandchildren that at least he floored a world champion.

Loughran signalled to the timekeeper no knockdown, indicating Patterson had been either pushed or slipped to the canvas. Patterson, more startled than wounded, was up at four. After the fight it was disclosed there had been a knockdown.

his trips to the canvas. Rademacher was never cut nor did Patterson ever feel him with one devastating blow after one long right put Pete down in the third.

FUTURE UNCERTAIN

Rademacher's future was uncertain Friday. But where he apparently fought the champion for no money at all he had an offer of hard cash—\$20,000 of it—from the International Boxing Club to fight in Madison Square Garden in November. Jim Norris, IBC president, wired the offer to the challenger and asked for an immediate reply, but Rademacher's decision was not forthcoming immediately.

Patterson gave Rademacher credit for his strength and tenacity. He said he was glad he hadn't underestimated the big fellow, who at 202 outweighed him 15 pounds.

Floyd, who was the first to confirm officially he had suffered a knockdown in the second, said he didn't exactly think this one blow floored Rademacher to status as a ranking pro heavyweight.

Patterson was guaranteed \$250,000 by the backers of Rademacher, organizers of Youth Unlimited, Inc., of Georgia.

NEW YORK (AP)—It was the mark of a top guy when Gabe Paul, the general manager, took the rap for the fading of Cincinnati Redlegs as a National League pennant contender.

Almost invariably in a similar situation, the man responsible for supplying players will take the easy way out when a club starts to fold. It isn't the easy way out for the manager. He gets fired. It's a subtle way of passing the buck. The fans seldom see or think much about them. What they see is on the field—and their target always is the manager.

He might be a combination of John McGraw, Casey Stengel, Joe McCarthy and Miller Huggins, but if the team doesn't win he gets the blame.

No matter if he has only little leaguers to put on the field he's supposed to win, that's all. The fans forget that the front office is responsible for having only little leaguers on the team.

TAKES THE RAP

"It is my belief that managers get too much blame when a club loses and too much credit when a club wins," Paul said in a prepared statement. "If there is any criticism for the failure to have a pitching 'bench' it can be directed at me."

Birdie Tebbets, he pointed out, is the same man who had the Redlegs in first place a good part of the first half of the season and as late as July 4 Paul might have added that Tebbets is the same man who had the club in the pennant race until the final gasp last year and only two games out of first place at the finish.
