### CNR Road-Rail Service Is On Occasional Basis

Permission has been granted to the Canadian National Railways to operate road-rail freight transport within the province, as in the past, and on an "occasional" basis "for holiday or weekend service" from railroad at places like Montserrat or Sackville, it was learned from F.A. Large, QC, counsel for the CNR on the island.

Mr. Large told this paper he is recommending a further application to be made for permission to operate daily service between mainland points and this province.

**OCCASIONAL BASIS**  
Sometimes ago, a news story said the CNR was asking permission to operate a daily truck service from mainland rail-

head points, and Douglas Lacombe, manager CNR public relations, Montserrat, said yesterday "with the restriction we'll only be able to give the people of P.E.I. our best service—that is 24 hours faster than at present—on an 'occasional' basis." The commission ruling, Mr. Large revealed, states that carriage of extra-provincial cargo at Charlottetown and Summerside is authorized with "no return loads."

The railway has been operating motor transport within the province since 1951, Mr. Lacombe said today. The CNR has also been operating on an irregular basis between mainland points and this province for a number of years, Mr. Lacombe added.

### Labor Initiative Claimed Stifled

Speaking at the Labor Relations meeting at St. Dunstan's University Monday evening, C. M. MacLean, manager of the Co-op Super Market suggested that the Unemployment Insurance Act has done much to stifle initiative in a great many people.

Dealing with the "duties of workers" he pointed out that "labor, for many, because of a license to receive unemployment insurance 'benefit'."

He noted that work becomes the price tag for long periods of relaxation and idleness on the part of the laboring class. He charged that, by and large, when labor is presented with more responsibility, for more wages, it is a people in question prefer to get away from responsibility and choose to work for the "stagnant now being received."

"Management," he said, "seeks managers from among its employees, and, with this in mind, it is on the lookout for responsibility and interest in its workers."

He noted that the task of any employee is to "show management that this theory is being exploited out of all proportions by business on Prince Edward Island today, and that employees were being falsely deceived into thinking that this

was the cause of wages on P.E.I. island remaining at 65 per cent below mainland parity for the rest of Canada."

The speaker began his lecture with a discussion of labor in Canada generally, stating that labor has duties towards Canada in as much as it is economic and political prestige of the nation will be determined to a great part by the contribution made by Canadians in the labor force.

Mr. MacLean stated that there is a great lack of responsibility on the part of some of the laboring class. ### Motorists Barred From Soviet Union

LONDON (AP)—No foreign motorists may drive into the Soviet Union after April 1 because tourist accommodations are fully booked, the London office of the Soviet Agency for Tourist announced Wednesday.

But it is still possible for tourists to enter the Soviet Union by aircraft, ship or train, an Interior spokesman said.

The accommodations which are fully booked, he explained, were those used by motorists between the Soviet borders and Moscow and between Moscow and southern Russia and the Ukraine. Nearly 1,000,000 tourists are expected to visit the Soviet Union from 85 foreign countries this year, the spokesman said.

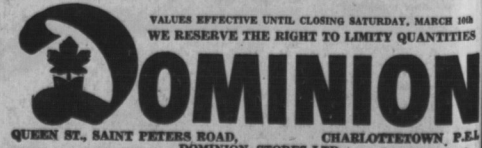
