At the annual meeting of Kensington School District, chaired by Mr. Roy MacArthur, an increase in supplement was voted to all teachers. The school secretary, Mrs. Carrie Kennedy was also voted a raise in salary, as well as a small amount to the Rev. L. M. Murray in appreciation of his help with the school music. The sum of \$100. was voted towards school prizes.

Appreciation was expressed of the faithful work being done by the teachers and the high standard of success attained by the students in the new high school. Owing to the resignation of Miss Etta MacDonald, Miss Mammie Mill was appointed to fill the vacancy in grade 9. Mr. T. J. The funeral was held on June 5th with service at the home conducted by Rev. Dr. C. A. Britten of Central Bedeque Baptist Church assisted by Rev. G. A. Cowper-Smith pastor of Bedeque United Church. Interment was in the Baptist cemetery, Central Bedeque.

Time Bomb Kills Seven And Wounds 83 In Algiers Casino

ALGIERS (AP)—A powerful time bomb exploded Sunday night under a dance band platform in a chic casino crowded with gay dancers, killing seven persons and wounding 83.

Some of the most prominent families in Algiers were in the crowd of 300 at the casino De la Corniche in the suburb of St. Eugene.

Gay young couples were dancing to a cha-cha-cha number when the bomb, presumably planted by Algerian terrorists, went off.

Most of the casino's "lucky starway" orchestra were believed killed. Arms and legs were blown from about a dozen persons.

Blood covered shattered tables and crockery.

The uninjured rushed to the aid of the screaming wounded. Among the dead, dying and injured were children from the family parties.

None of the dead was over 25. Of those injured, 25 were in grave condition.

Ambulances and first-aid squads sped to the casino, a two-story, yellow stucco building in a palm garden on a cliff jutting out into the sea.

HIDDEN IN BANDSTAND  
Police said the bomb was hid-

den in the bandstand's concrete base. The stand was raised about a foot above the level of the dance floor in the gaily decorated room.

Police were looking for an Algerian steward at the casino who vanished before the bomb went off.

"This is not politics, this is murder," said a French policeman.

The police blamed the bombing on Algerian nationalist terrorists who six days ago planted bombs in three lampposts near crowded bus and streetcar stops. The bombs went off during the late rush hour, killing four and wounding 84.

French officials said the bombing apparently was to stir up excitement abroad over the 31-month-old rebellion and bring the United Nations into the dispute, or to get a quick, favorable settlement from a new French government.

The terrorist strike came as Robert Lacoste, resident minister for Algeria, was conferring in Paris with Premier Designate Maurice Bourges-Maunoury, presumably over measures to take in Algeria.

Plumbing Warehouse At S'side Destroyed By Fire

A disastrous fire in mid-afternoon yesterday which completely gutted the warehouse of the Inman Plumbing and Heating Ltd., on Water Street, causing an estimated damage of \$10,000 in stock and equipment and property damage. Also destroyed were two other smaller buildings adjacent to the warehouse: one a garage owned by Mr. J. Elmer Murphy, Hanover Street and the other owned by the estate of the late Mrs. Joseph Hickey, also on Hanover Street.

The cause of the fire had not been ascertained. It was first noticed by Mrs. Elmer Murphy at which time the smoke and flames appeared to be coming from the rear of their garage which was only a few feet from the Inman warehouse. The flames spread with great rapidity, engulfing the garage on the Hickey property and in a short time all three buildings were a mass of flame.

For a time it was feared that the Canadian Legion Honor would burn as well. The home is separated from the Inman property by a narrow alleyway and at the rear of the home was connected with the Inman warehouse by a small building. However due to the fine work of the Fire Department the flames were kept sufficiently under control to prevent spreading to the Legion property.

The two garages, which were of wooden construction, were burned to the ground and the warehouse, also of wooden construction, was so badly gutted that all stock and equipment stored with would seem to be a complete loss.

RMA Proposes Federal Loan Plan For The Small Retailer

Mr. J. Frank Jenkins, president of the Maritime Division of the Retail Merchants Association, over the week-end that he has received word from the National office in Winnipeg that the Retail Merchants Association has proposed to the Dominion Government that a retail business capital loan be set up for the purpose of enabling retailers to borrow money for modernization and expansion. It has been suggested that the mechanics of such an act be similar to those of the Home Improvement Loans Act, that the individual loan be made through the chartered banks with a government guarantee.

This, he said, does not introduce any new principle into Canadian Finance. Similar assistance has already been extended to manufacturers, farmers, fishermen, food processors, home owners, home repairs, etc. It is only necessary to extend the same financial arrangements to cover independent retail stores, and in that way sufficient capital will be available to them so that they can operate on an even footing with the corporate retailers who have access to the money market.

The association has received the following telegram from the Hon. Walter E. Harris, Minister of Finance:

"Reference your representation suggesting that Federal legislation similar to the Home Improvement Loans Guarantee Act and the Farm Improvement Loans Act be made applicable to retail merchants. There do appear to be similarities between the position of those who benefit from the legislation mentioned on the other hand there are some special problems in the retailing field which do not arise in other fields. The whole matter would require careful detailed study. Members of the government will be glad to discuss the whole matter with you and those other members of the government with a view to seeing what concrete steps could be taken to provide benefits analogous to those contained in the Home Improvement Loans Guarantee Act and the Farm Improvement Loans Act."
