

Side Aces Nip Montague 6-5 In Island League Game

The Summerside Aces won another squeaker last night edging the Montague Primroses by the score of 6-5 in a regular fixture of the Prince Edward Island League.

The first period ended 3-1 in favor of the Aces, and the home boys were ahead 5-1 early in the middle frame, but Montague roared back with two goals and the period ended with the score 5-4 for the Summerside club. The Primroses, still commanding the play, tied it up at 7:13 of the final period, but half way through the chukker the Aces shot the winning counter.

Ron MacArthur, besides playing a sound defensive game, put the frosting on the cake with 2 goals and an assist on the winning marker to win the unanimous nod from the judges for the most valuable player award and the Holman Tookie shirt.

Hughes shot two goals for the visitors.

MacArthur got the first counter of the evening, carrying the puck over the blue-line, eluding one defence man, and swinging into scoring position to blast one past Dillon. Montague evened it up when

Hughes made it 5-4 triggering a combination play with Carroll and MacLean.

Hughes tied the score after seven minutes of play in the final frame, carrying all the way down ice to beat Mann with a whipping shot that tucked inside the post. Cutcliffe got the winner at 19:15 after MacArthur had carried from his own blue-line and set Cut-

cliffe up with a pass from behind the cage.

Curlers Return Weary But Happy From European Tour

Sixty three members of the Maritime Flying Curlers Club arrived weary but happy back from their European tour early yesterday morning when their big 4-motored, chartered DC4 aircraft touched down at Moncton airport at 3:45 a.m. Islanders in the group took the 7:30 flight to Charlottetown and arrived here about 8:15.

The Islanders were high in their praise of the hospitality shown them during their trip and were in agreement that the tour had been a wonderful experience.

Dr. E.S. Giddings, secretary-treasurer of the Flying Curlers Club, described the journey as "great" and said: "The people over there - especially the Scottish people - are very much like ourselves. They went all out to make the trip an enjoyable one."

Dr. Giddings said that after the Maritime curlers got used to the type of game played by the Scottish curlers they held their own in matches. "Scottish curlers," said Dr. Giddings, "play a draw game while we are used to a draw and running game. Their ice is not pebbled but, after playing in Glasgow, we held our own in other matches."

The curlers took to the ice at almost every stop except in Paris and at London it was officially confirmed that the club was the first group of Canadian curlers ever to play in England's Capital City.

While in London Dr. Giddings took in a Parliamentary debate. The stay in Paris was devoted to sightseeing. One night 50 members of the group visited the Lido night club and were surprised to find that one of the variety numbers featured at the club was also presented in Charlottetown a few years ago on the Old Home

Ted Lindsay Heads Newly Formed NHL Player Ass'n

NEW YORK (CP) — A group of National Hockey League players Monday formed a players' association with Ted Lindsay of Detroit Red Wings as president to "promote, foster and protect the best interests of National Hockey League players."

After an organizational meeting here Lindsay said the league could use a better pension plan. He said the association has retained the law firm of J. Norman Lewis and Milton M. Mound to represent it. Lewis also represents the Major League baseball players' group which recently gained an improved pension plan.

The current NHL plan, in force since 1947, calls for a player with two years service to receive a starting at age 45. Increased payments are made on a graduating basis based on experience.

Lindsay said all but one NHL player has joined the association. He did not identify the player.

"Actually, we don't have many grievances," explained Lindsay

"We just felt we should have an organization of this kind."
"The idea was brought up at

last year's all-star game in Montreal. We talked the whole thing over and felt this was the way to do it. We have not talked to the owners yet. In fact, I don't believe they knew it was in the works."

Johnny Heim, whose mat shows frequently pack the huge Milwaukee Arena, took a dim view of a recent proposal of the state athletic commission to regulate wrestling.

"It would be no good," said Heim. "They would have to run it like college wrestling — honest — and that wouldn't work."

"You can't sell a legitimate contest. There hasn't been a legitimate wrestling contest in 50 years. We tried it once. You could have heard a pin drop in the auditorium. If you put on a legitimate contest, no one would come back for the next one."

Thieves Get Only \$3,000 In Robbery Of Boston Garden

Boston (AP) — A burglar gang, intent on stealing the weekend receipts of two capacity Bruins hockey games, a full-house Celtics basketball game and the Tony Demarco - gaspar Ortega fight, fled Boston Garden under tear gas early Monday with only \$3,000.

Garden officials said the robbers apparently sought all the receipts from the sporting events — probably as much as \$100,000. But they added no big amounts of money are kept in the office. They said also there is usually a heavy advance ticket sale.

The burglars — believed to number seven — tied up an 81-year-old watchman and cracked a five-inch thick safe with acetylene torches only to be met by a blast of tear gas from a protective device inside.

They left bags of silver straw along the concourse of the big sports arena as they made their escape.

Robert Dunbar, the watchman, told police he heard a knock and went to the door. "I opened it to see who it was," he said, "and they came in with a rush. They threw a blanket over my head and knocked me down. They tied me and left me in the middle of the concourse. They knew where
