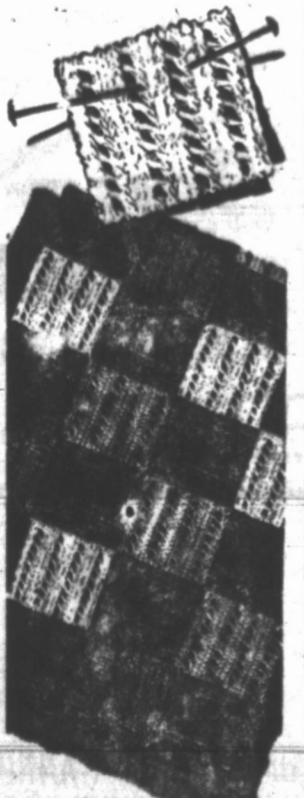

Help Is Needed To Adjust While Awaiting Divorce

DEAR MARY HAWORTH: Recently you supplied a helpful suggestion to a woman with a gambler husband. You advised her to get in touch with Gamblers Anonymous, through their national headquarters address (P. O. Box 17178, Los Angeles 17, California.)

My problem doesn't concern gambling, but loneliness. I have been separated from my husband for several months. Eventually we shall be divorced, after we have reached a mutually acceptable agreement.

Meanwhile I find myself a sort of fifth wheel, left out of many things.

It occurs to me, from the reference to Gamblers Anonymous, that there may be similar organizations for separated or divorced persons; to help them adjust to their new status, make new acquaintances, and discuss problems related to their situation.

That kind of association could be most helpful to me, as I don't have roots here, all my relatives living in other states. May I have your advice regarding such groups, if any, or other suggestions for getting through this most trying period. Sincerely, P.G.

DEAR P.G.: Maybe 10 or more years ago, Reader's Digest published an article about a group then known as Divorcees Anonymous, originating in Chicago, Ill., and dedicated to the purpose of trying to head-off non-constructive divorces.

As I recall, spokesmen for the group had introduced themselves and their good intentions to officers of various courts of domestic relations and legal associations, which dealt with divorce suits, and volunteered to counsel with persons seeking divorce, to open their eyes to the realistic aftermath of divorce, before too late.

Did I forget to mention that members of Divorcees Anonymous were divorced men and women who, on second thought, wouldn't do it again; but rather would stick to the original partner and devote a lifetime to trying to make the best of things, instead of quitting.

Maybe this isn't the type of hospitality group you are looking for. But if it is, try your local public library for possible back-issue, cross-reference clues, to help you put your finger on the magazine article aforementioned, as a start in tracking down local chapters, if any.

Or write directly to the magazine, c/o Reader's Digest Association, Inc., Pleasantville, N.Y., for a reprint or photostat copy of its latest published data on the subject of Divorcees Anonymous.

Also, as a further suggestion, study Jim and Janet Frank Egleson's book "Parents Without Partners," subtitled "A guide for divorced, widowed and separated parents," published by E. P. Dutton and Co., Inc., in 1961.

This book tells the story of a national, non-profit, non-sectarian educational organization ("Parents Without Partners"), chartered March 12, 1958, by the state of New York, which is devoted to the interests

of single parents and their children.

Very possibly there are local units of this multi-faceted activity in your area. Only a parent it may be the answer to your present needs, or social anchorage. M.H.

And old girl friends of his don't belong in the picture. As you say, he chooses the best man and ushers, usually in consultation with the bride and her parents, since, in sum total, it is their show, not his. M.H.

Italian Woman Heads PTA Group

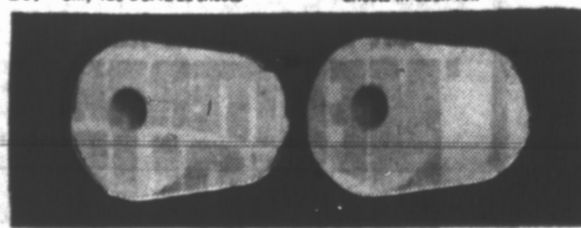
