Speech Forecasts

Continued from page 1. In view of the unsettled World conditions, the deliberations were eventually limited to consideration of the fiscal arrangements between the Provinces and the Dominion. With the impending termination of the tax rental agreements, and in order to avoid the prospect of a return to a dual system of direct taxation, a Federal-Provincial arrangement has been reached, whereby certain Provinces suspend the levying and collection of Income Taxes and Succession duties for the next five years. In return for this concession the Government of Canada is to make annually to the agreeing provinces certain agreed compensatory payments. You will be asked to consider a Bill to authorize the Government of Prince Edward Island to enter into an agreement implementing the proposed arrangement. Mr. Peter D. visions of such an arrangement. "5. A proposal to provide a franchise to the Canadian National Railways to operate buses instead of passenger trains in all sections of the province except between Charlottetown and Borden will be presented for your consideration. It is the intention of my Government to recommend a select standing committee on Transportation to hear representations for and against this proposed change. "6. Owing to the demand for electoral reform, it is proposed to deal with this question by the appointment of a Committee of the Legislature, which will study the matter and report on its findings at the earliest opportunity. "7. The need of a treatment centre at Falconwood Hospital has been carefully considered by my Government and suitable plans have been prepared. You will be asked to vote sufficient money to commence its construction during the present year. A centre for the treatment of poliomyelitis was set up in the Provincial Sanatorium Building during the past year, and the number of patients who passed through this centre has fully warranted the monies expended on the completion of this treatment wing. On the first day of this month an Out-patient Clinic was opened in Charlottetown for the care of the mentally ill. A Bill to provide for the amalgamation of all social welfare work will be introduced for your consideration and you will also be asked to consider increased per patient day grants to the general hospitals in the Province. Fisheries Services "10. The Fisheries services are being extended to provide draggers more adaptable to Prince Edward Island Harbours, to provide, if possible, suitable gear for smaller craft and to determine, if possible, the quantities of fish in the Eastern Gulf. The Fisheries Development Committee, set up last year under the chairmanship of the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, is continuing its studies with a view to submitting for later consideration a program of expansion of the fishing industry in the Province. "11. The Forestry programme will be extended. "12. My Government proposes to extend the opening of quarries in order to provide sandstone for road bases. "13. During the past year my Government has administered the affairs of the Province with every possible economy consistent with the necessary increased social and general public services provided. Financing has been successfully carried out and the sinking funds remain at a high and satisfactory level. "14. The accounts and reports of the various departments of my Government for the past fiscal year and the Estimates for the coming fiscal year will be presented for your consideration, together with a number of proposed statutes and amendments, including amendments to The Bailable Proceedings Act, The Conditional Sales Act, The Interpretation Act, The Judicature Act, The Highway Traffic Act, The Probate Act, The Trustee Act, The School Act, The Companies' Act, The Plant Disease Eradication Act, The Bulk Sales Act and The Workmen's Compensation Act. "15. May Divine Providence bless your deliberations."

Teachers' Salaries "8. In 1947 salaries of school teachers were increased by approximately forty-two per cent. Now, five years later, after a new Dominion Provincial agreement, my government proposes further increases over the present salaries. These will be in both statutory salary and duplicate supplement. To encourage greater numbers of young people to train for the teaching profession additional assistance in the form of scholarships will be proposed. Following the established policy of my Government to offset the rising cost of school text books through the method of subvention, it is proposed to increase further the subvention grant. Encouraged by Provincial assistance, school districts have made unprecedented progress in the building and renovating of schools. It is the intention of my Government to continue to provide this financial assistance. My Government views with satisfaction the decision of the Federal Government to act upon the recommendation of the Royal Commission on National Development in the Arts, Letters and Sciences and
