

Steamship Captain Tells Of Aiding Two Canadians

ROTTERDAM (Reuters) — A Greek Steamship captain told Wednesday how two Canadian adventurers stumbled aboard his ship in the Atlantic from the storm-battered ketch and after accepting food and supplies set out again in their tiny vessel for England.

"Thank God, captain, God is good," Captain Leonidas Angelides of the Librarian freighter Mar-blanca quoted the Canadians as saying last Saturday when they came aboard to receive their first solid food in five days.

Angelides said the ketch Orenda was spotted because a sharp lookout was being kept on the Mar-blanca for survivors or wreckage of a United States Air Force plane reported lost in the area with 59 men aboard.

500 MILES FROM ENGLAND

The two men aboard the Orenda, Bert Smith, 31, of Toronto and

Alan Battersby, 29, formerly of Blackpool, England, sailed from North Sydney, N.S., Sept. 22.

Angelides, who arrived in Rotterdam Wednesday, said the Mar-blanca hove to when it spotted the Orenda about 500 miles off the southwest tip of England, and the ketch came alongside.

The Orenda was sighted in mid-Atlantic Sept. 22 by the United States liner America which reported she craft a derelict after circling it for 40 minutes and finding no sign of life.

Both Smith and Battersby were scarcely able to speak until they had been given hot milk and coffee, Angelides said. They later told him that the boom of the Orenda had been snapped in a storm and they had had nothing solid to eat for five days.

DECIDE TO CONTINUE

Both were determined to continue their voyage although An-

gelides said he begged them to ride into port aboard the Mar-blanca.

In Toronto Smith's mother Mrs. May Smith, said she is "very proud" that her son and Battersby decided to continue the voyage in the Orenda.

"I admire him. I know they'll make it."

The ship captain said he gave the sailors provisions for about 40 days and material to repair the broken boom and tattered sails. As the Orenda sailed off again, he radioed his home office in Rotterdam and London that the "lost" men were safe.

The wives of the two sailors have never given up hope their husbands were alive. Mrs. Smith said two weeks ago she believed they might have been inside the Orenda's cabin when it was sighted by the America after a bad Atlantic storm.

Hong Kong Editor To Speak At Various P. E. I. Meetings

During a three-day visit to Prince Edward Island the editor of the Hong Kong Sunday Examiner will deliver a public address on "Asia Today" on November 4. She will also speak at Summerside and other island centres. Appointed editor of a Hong Kong Roman Catholic weekly newspaper, Elizabeth Reid soon found her job included finding employment for jobless workers and campaigning for funds for thousands of Chinese refugees who flocked to the island.

Interviewed here during a speaking tour, Miss Reid, of Brisbane, Australia, described her work as a journalist member of the Grail Apostolate Movement, an international Catholic women's organization.

She reported on the Korean prisoner-of-war exchange, the siege of Dien Bien Phu, the 1; Africa fortress, and the Bandung African-Asian conference.

As a roving reporter for the national Catholic news service, Washington, she visited Korea, Japan, Formosa, Vietnam and Malaya.

In Korea, her assignment was to describe the plight of homeless mothers and children in the hope of getting relief from the United States and Australia.

One of her pictures, that of a refugee mother feeding rice she had warmed in her own mouth to

her baby, brought 200 tons of milk powder from the U. S.

Her newspaper raised enough money to build 200 houses in Hong Kong, which were given to refugees.
