

Revolution Is Planned In Russian Agriculture

MOSCOW (AP)—The Communists' powerful central committee gave its chief, Nikita S. Khrushchev, the go-ahead Thursday for a far-reaching revolution in Soviet agriculture.

The committee, after a two-day session, announced endorsement of Khrushchev's proposals to shift leadership from the machine-tractor stations to collective farms.

A party committee issued after the committee sessions Monday and Tuesday said the committee acted on a proposal first announced by Khrushchev in a speech at Minsk Jan. 22.

It advanced a five-point program to transfer machinery from the thousands of machine-tractor stations scattered over the U.S.S.R. to collective farms and to reorganize the stations into maintenance units.

The committee said the stations in recent years were big organizational force in the struggle to liquidate certain backward branches of agricultural production.

standing collective farms and throttled initiative among farm personnel.

The committee said, however that Soviet agriculture has been making significant strides in recent years, along with Soviet industry.

If the central committee discussed any other subjects in its two-day meeting, no announcement was made of it.

The Khrushchev plan involves liquidating the system of machine-tractor stations instituted by Stalin in 1928. These points allocated farm machinery to the collective farms.

There now are more than 9,000 of these stations, but by official party admission, the system has been a brake on production. Party leaders have referred to the system as creating "two masters on the same soil" and bringing about "irrational use" of the machinery.

Khrushchev referred to his proposals as a "reorganization" of the system, rather than liquidation of it.

The tractor-station system provided a potent political weapon for the party to exercise control and even mete out punishment to collective farms by withdrawing machinery. In effect, the liquidation of the stations is a

or even the reorganization of the system represents another Soviet retreat from Stalinism.

Wiltshire Dairying Company Reports A Successful Year

The Wiltshire Dairying Company paid out more money to its patrons in 1957 than ever before, it was revealed at the annual meeting held recently.

Reviewing the year's work president Edwin Edwards said that the year's business was down about 5,000 lbs. in production but more money had been paid to patrons than in any other year on record and the company made a profit, after income tax, of \$3,767.70.
