Our Communications.

We have had very regular communications throughout the summer. The somewhat antiquated arrangements have been well maintained.

But the tide of business with the world was suddenly stopped at the busiest season of the year. From Saturday until to-day we had no mail.

The effect upon this Province can be better imagined than described. If the stoppage couldn't be helped, if our circumstances and conditions were the same as they were fifty years ago, we could bear with fortitude and equanimity the loss and inconvenience to which we have been subjected.

Can it be wondered that men of all parties are indignant? We have no hesitation in saying that more damage has been done the Liberal Conservative Party in this Province by reason of this fact, than by reason of anything else that could be named.

Who is to be held responsible? We are compelled to hold responsible the Hon Charles Tupper, Minister of Marine and Fisheries. Some of the officials under his control have neglected their duties.

We have no trouble with the other Department's of the Government. The Railway Department—particularly since Sir John Macdonald became its minister and Mr. Unsworth the local superintendent—has given the people of Prince Edward Island great satisfaction.

In Brazil, marriage must now be celebrated before a civil officer; the religious ceremony is not obligatory. In no way can the Church interfere, because marriage is regarded as a civil contract; and, as such, is relegated to the State.

"HOME RULE."

Justin McCarthy to Lead the Nationalist Majority.

Gladstone Greatly Pleased on Hearing of the Result.

Parnell's Constituency Condemns Him.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—The opponents of Parnell, who withdrew from the Nationalist meeting in a body on Saturday, afterwards held a meeting in the conference room.

When Mr. McCarthy had assumed the chair, the meeting proceeded to consider the following resolution: "We, members of the Irish Parliamentary Party, solemnly renew our adhesion to its principles, in devotion to which we have never wavered; that the Irish party is, and always must remain, independent of all other parties; further, we declare we will never entertain any proposal for settlement of the Home Rule question except such as satisfies the aspirations of the Irish party and the Irish people."

The conference of the party was prolonged until after midnight on Saturday night. Mr. McCarthy presided throughout the session. A committee consisting of Messrs. Murphy, Barry, Morrugh, Healy, Sexton and Power was appointed to draft the prospectus for a limited company to establish a newspaper in Ireland, to be devoted to the interests of the Nationalist party.

Both sides are preparing for an immediate campaign in Ireland. A meeting of Nationalists was held in Phoenix Park, Dublin, yesterday. The Lord Mayor, who presided, moved a resolution that Parnell was alone fitted to lead the nation. He challenged Parnell's opponents, whom he characterized as political lepers, to come to Ireland and see how they would be received.

The Irish parliamentary fund, amounting to £20,000, remains under the control of Parnell, with the exception of £1,200, which is in the hands of the treasurer.

Justin McCarthy denies there was a scene of disorder when he and his associates left the Irish caucus and says: "On the contrary, when I returned to the room for my coat, which I had left behind me, Parnell's followers took the opportunity to shake hands cordially with me, and all expressed regret at the split in the party."

In response to a call issued by Justin McCarthy, leader of the anti-Parnellite section of the Irish party, all the members of the party opposed to Parnell assembled to-day to further consider the line of policy to be adopted.

A council comprising eight members was appointed to assist McCarthy in deciding the future action of the party and an adjournment until two o'clock to-morrow.

The O'Gorman Mahon, member of parliament for Carlow County, who introduced Parnell to Mrs. O'Shea, has only been dissuaded from challenging Parnell by his physician. Mahon is 87 years old.

DUBLIN, Dec. 8.—The Express (Independent Conservative) says: The prospects for home rule for Ireland at the next election are as dead as Queen Anne.

Island about Wednesday, sailing in Halifax on his return.—Halifax Chronicle.

On account of the severity of the weather quite a number of vessels have been detained from loading, but it is to be hoped that the weather will again become mild and they will be able to load and get away before navigation will be finally closed.

The storm of the 1st inst. was something extraordinary. The oldest people here say that they never saw such a high tide. It rose over the wharves and damaged quite an amount of starch and salt which Prowse & Sons had in a building on their wharf.

At Beach Point, where Daniel Davies has his fishing establishment, one or two houses were dislodged and swept away. The occupants were not injured, but the winter stores which those poor people had so diligently labored for throughout the summer were all lost.

At present the roads are in a shocking condition, neither fit for sleigh nor wagon. The mailman has great difficulty in traveling, and we are not able to obtain our mail regularly. What we should have is the "iron horse."
