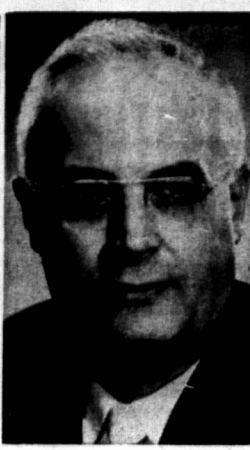

**Secret Stairway Goes With Office Of The Hon. Angus**

OTTAWA (CP) — A new minister has inherited the secret stairway of Parliament Hill. The secret "escape hatch" goes with the office of Fisheries Minister J. Angus MacLean. Long the source of speculation and rumor, the spiral staircase leads from his office in the West Block of the Parliament Buildings to the street below. Rumor once said that Sir John A. Macdonald, Canada's first prime minister from 1867 to 1873, used the secret staircase to avoid

seeing callers, but recent research has shown the staircase was built by his Liberal successor, Hon. Alexander Mackenzie, prime minister from 1873 to 1878. After holding office for two years, Mr. Mackenzie, apparently hemmed in by patronage petitioners, ordered the staircase built. A public works voucher for the project is in the public archives. Mr. Mackenzie also ordered the construction of the picturesque spire atop the West Block, now called Mackenzie Tower.

**Gathers Shots To Fire At Yanks**

LONDON (AP) — Britain's ambassador to the United States is back home gathering ammunition to fire at Americans when he returns to Washington.

Sir Harold Caccia, a dynamic diplomat with an impish smile, during a leave here has been quietly going around Britain gathering material — or as he says, "making a few more bullets about our greatness to fire at Americans."

Sir Harold sent up a trial balloon a few months ago by reminding Americans that Britain held the official world speed records in the air, on land and water. . . discovered atomic nucleus and penicillin, pioneered television and the jet engine.

Over a tea cup in a west end club he joked about the reaction to his first "shot."

"To begin with," he said, "the Americans refused to believe it. They said to themselves 'of course, we have the biggest, the fastest, and the greatest.'"

HUGE FAN MAIL — "So many of them rang me up

afterward to find out if what I had said was really true and I had a huge fan mail."

Sir Harold, who is returning to Washington this week, said: "I am determined to continue selling Britain in America. I am sure the more we explain ourselves to Americans, the sooner we shall settle any little misunderstanding, which may crop up between us."

He admitted that Americans sometimes find the British difficult to understand.

"One minute we have a great empire, the next we are trying to give it away," he smiled. "One minute I tell them of the wonderful things we are doing, and the next we are saying we are broke."

"But," he added confidently, "I have complete faith in the future of Anglo-American relations provided Britain speaks out about Britain."

And that's what Sir Harold intends to do.

PROPOSE ARMY CUT — SEUL (AP)—The independent Korean newspaper Hankook ILBO reports today the United States has proposed that South Korea reduce its 700,000-man armed force. The U.S. Embassy refused to comment.

PORTLAND, M. (AP)—A vice-president of the Maine Lobstermen's Association predicted Wednesday that most of the state's 4,000 lobstermen will stop hauling traps by Friday in protest against a drop in prices from 35 to 30 cents a pound.

Rodney M. Cushing of Cliff Island said an estimated 400 to 500 Casco Bay lobstermen refused to haul traps Wednesday and that operations there are "tied up tight."

He said the MLA will meet it Rockland Friday to consider the price dispute, caused by a depressed market. He said lobstermen are unable to operate on the new price.

The situation is similar to that of last September when the price also dipped to 30 cents. Then dealers agreed to pay a minimum of 35 cents after most Maine lobstermen had been idle for six days.

CONFESSES FAILURE — BERLIN (AP) — Communist East Germany admitted Wednesday it has fallen behind by more than 100,000,000 reles in promised deliveries of heavy machinery to Russia. By Red accounting, that's more than \$25,000,000. Trade Minister Heinrich Rau confessed this "irresponsible failure" before the communist's party central committee.
