

Metro Discusses Centennial Plan

A discussion of plans for Centennial year was featured at a meeting of the Metropolitan Committee last night at Prince of Wales College.

Guest speakers were William Hayward, manager of the Centennial Committee; and committee members Mr. Justice George Tweedy, Col. E. W. Johnstone and E. S. Chandler. Mr. Hayward gave an overall picture of the work of the committee so far in planning for Centennial celebrations, and stressed in particular the need for both rural and urban districts to form their own ideas for Centennial year projects.

He said groups should then discuss with the committee their specific plans for 1964 projects. "The Centennial committee can only help, and in a small way," he stated.

LASTING MEMORIALS
Mr. Hayward also emphasized the value of planning lasting memorials to Centennial year, rather than a temporary observance.

Some of the projects in mind, Mr. Justice Tweedy said, include the development of a park in the Bunbury area, beautification of entrances to the city, and decorative lighting of churches to other suitable buildings throughout the province.

Among other ideas suggested were the development of a small park at Wood Islands and general beautification of the terminal area; construction of a Scottish "village" and further development of Selkirk Park; having road signs and mailboxes in rural areas repaired and painted; and the improvement of eyesores along the highway such as gravel pits and littered ditches.

FLORAL DISPLAY
A project suggested by Con. Johnstone was a floral display of the coats of arms of the four initial provinces to unite, Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

Mr. Chandler indicated his willingness to advise groups on types and the proper use of fixtures used for decorative lighting of fountains, gardens and buildings.

It was stated that the city was contemplating the construction of lighted arches at any specific time.

The Metropolitan Committee decided to organize a co-ordinating meeting of its various sub-committees, to discuss concrete suggestions for centennial projects.

Chairman Donald Stewart presided.

Apprenticeship Training Plan Studied By Advisory Group

The local employment advisory committee met Wednesday night at the National Employment Office and heard Malcolm Macdonald, director of apprenticeship training, explain the apprenticeship training program for this province.

The members of the committee, under the chairmanship of Edwin Brown, past president of the Charlottetown branch of the Royal Canadian Legion, are studying all of the programs available to this province related to vocational technical and apprenticeship training as a preliminary step to making recommendations to the provincial authorities.

These recommendations will be aimed at upgrading workers' qualifications, retraining the handicapped, training of the unemployed and training for

Other matters dealt with at the meeting included a report on a resolution adopted previously by the committee supporting a universal minimum wage law for this province. This resolution is now in the hands of the Provincial Labor Relations Board.

The Gazette says Mr. Pearson did not intend any disclosure of his proposal unless an election a stalemate occurred, but the fact that it has circulated "is attributable to at least a minor indiscretion on Mr. Pearson's own part."

It says Mr. Pearson expressed these views at the Montreal press reception when he was asked what he thought could, would or should happen after the election if neither the Liberals nor the Conservatives won a clear majority. He is reported to have said he would be opposed to another early election in such circumstances.

He did not believe it reasonable, however, that a major party should have to rely on the support of a smaller party whose doctrine or policies it could not share.

But no vast policy gulf separated the Conservatives and Liberals. In an emergency could be drawn together.

To make such a thing possible, Mr. Pearson is reported to have said, he was prepared to resign "and hope that Mr. Diefenbaker will do the same."
