Berra, who relinquished the regular Yankees catching job to Hank Aaron in 1960, was named manager of the club two weeks ago after Ralph Houk was elevated to the general manager's post.

"I've got a great deal," said Howard. "He helped me a lot — along with Bill Dickey — when the Yankees decided to convert me from an outfielder into a catcher. Now I've got a chance to repay him."

The two teams met Saturday at Lansdowne Park in the sudden-death Eastern Football Conference semifinal. Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m. AST and the game will be televised on the CBC network.

Commenting on Montreal's plan to put a big rush on Jackson on pass attempts, Clair said: "They're being doing that all year. I'm sure we can give Russ all the protection he needs."
