# Thoughts For Our Time

**WORK BENEFICIAL TO ALL**  
 There is something which each of us does every day, and from which we would often like to escape, but it pursues us everywhere; and that is work. In the journey of life there are few men who can afford to sit back and do nothing. The problem of earning a living faces each adult human being.  
 Today, when pleasure-seeking is sometimes carried to excess; work is often looked upon as something evil, as something unnatural to man. It is often considered to be a kind of infringement upon our liberty. It takes away from our times of recreation. It is a curtailment upon our fun. Besides, work is frequently difficult and causes us to suffer. Any type of labor will tire us within a few hours.  
 In addition, the monotony, or on the other hand, the tedious exactitudes of our work, can add to its burden. The conditions under which we carry out our daily tasks such as inclement weather, unpleasant fellow workers, irritating noises and so on, can all cause us at times to flee from the prospect of work, and to even wish that we could spend our life in ease, having every desire fulfilled without effort.  
 I may have portrayed work as being something ugly, as a necessary evil from which no one can completely escape. However, this is not at all what I consider work to be, as you will presently see.  
 When we speak of work, we generally mean the process or activity by which some material

product is brought forth, or by which some material improvement is effected. Therefore, men who are occupied in making automobiles or aircraft, or smaller articles such as our clothes and shoes, are truly working as their labors are going into the production of some material object. The same is true of a musician or poet, although their work and their final achievements are loftier in the scale of perfection. Even when we wash the dishes or sweep the floor there is true work, as a material improvement is brought about.  
 However, I wish to extend the meaning of the term "work" to include every useful human activity. An action such as thinking, in which there is nothing produced externally, is therefore, a type of work. I can then define work as the activity by which man expresses the abilities which he possesses.  
 In this sense, work sounds very easy and uncomplicated. It is simply the unfolding of the powers or abilities which we possess as human beings. This means that work is not bad, because it is natural for man. It is unnatural not to work. If a person of genius, such as an outstanding poet or artist, were to refuse to put his talent to use, we would say that he was wasting his life. He is not being a complete human being as his genius lies languishing and inert.  
 The majority of people, however, do not possess such exceptional ability. They are like you and me. They are quite ordinary.
