# Sawchuk Traded To Boston Bruins In "Million-Dollar" Nine-Player Exchange

DETROIT, (CP)—Terry Sawchuk, the brilliant goalie who was in the doghouse more than once during his five years with Detroit Red Wings, was traded to Boston Bruins in a "million-dollar" nine-player exchange between the two National Hockey League clubs announced Friday.

General Manager Jack Adams, one of the sharpest judges of hockey flesh and a firm believer in the "shake well" treatment, swapped his 25-year-old ace net-minder and three other forwards for five Boston players including two fine forwards.

Sawchuk, stocky but quick-moving native of Winnipeg, allowed an average of less than two goals a game in this five seasons in a Detroit uniform, a remarkable record, but he also had one of the best defences in front of him. In mid-season, Adams ordered Sawchuk to take a two-game "rest." But the Bruins undoubtedly are more than pleased to get a goalie of Sawchuk's calibre and experience. The netminding position long has been a problem for the Boston club, dating back to the time of Frankie Brimsek. Glenn Hazelet took over during Sawchuk's "rest" period, but Adams said that he would like to see Sawchuk's "rest" period, which swept to an unprecedented seventh straight NHL championship, and then added its second straight Stanley Cup title.

DEAL WITH CHICAGO

Adams' strategy of "breaking up" championship teams is nothing new. In fact, it has come to be expected in Detroit hockey circles. In the past, Jolly Jawn has dealt off such outstanding stars as goalie Harry Lumley and defenceman Jack Stewart and Bill Quackenbush.

But Adams always had a fine rookie crop ready to step up to the Red Wings. He feels he has such a group of youngsters on hand now.

Despite his fine record with the Wings, it is generally understood Adams is not likely to stay in Detroit in recent seasons. His name had frequently been linked with trade rumors.

KEY PLAYER  
Sawchuk, key player in the latest deal, won the Calder trophy for the outstanding rookie in the NHL in the 1950-51 season. That was the year he replaced Lumley, traded to Toronto Maple Leafs.

Terry, a suave player with lightning hands, won the Vezina trophy in both 1951-52 and 1952-53. Adams blamed himself for Detroit's stunning collapse in the playoffs, losing to Boston in a first-round upset.

## Seek Commission Probe Of Government Spending

OTTAWA (CP)—The Progressive Conservative Opposition is demanding that an independent commission review the whole field of government operations and spending.

Opposition leader Drew said Tuesday in the Commons the investigation could bring enormous savings in public funds by recommending business-like ways of running the government.

The commission, he said, could get the facts on government spending which were hidden to Parliament behind closed doors.

"Wherever any door has been opened, it has been found that the facts could be made by more efficient methods."

J. M. Macdonnell, the party's financial critic, said few cabinet ministers are experienced business administrators. The expense of an inquiry would be offset by the likelihood of savings enormous.

## Returns From Impressive Ceremony In Newfoundland

OTTAWA, June 2. (Special)—On his return to Ottawa from St. John's, Nfld., J. Watson MacNaught, parliamentary assistant to Fisheries Minister Sinclair, today told The Guardian that he was most deeply impressed at the ceremony there last week when crews of the Portuguese fishing fleet presented a statue of Our Lady of Fatima to the St. John's Roman Catholic Cathedral.

MacNaught was the official representative of the government of Canada at the ceremony. "It was a great sight and a wonderful display of international friendship," Mr. MacNaught said.

The fishermen, 3,000 strong, marched through the crowded streets of the old St. John's carrying the statue with them for presentation to the cathedral. They filled the church and were welcomed by the Archbishop who accepted the statue and blessed it.

## Committee Approves CNR Operation Motor Vehicles

OTTAWA (CP)—The Commons railway committee Friday approved a clause in a Commons bill giving the CNR power to operate motor vehicles in conjunction with or as substitutes for its rail service.

The committee, which is considering a bill updating the CNR act, heard objections to the clause from the Canadian Trucking Associations and some committee members.

The associations contended that such motor vehicle service would be an integral part of the CNR interprovincial rail services and would thus be outside provincial jurisdiction.

## PATRICK HAPPY OVER SAWCHUK

BOSTON (AP)—General manager Lynn Patrick of the National Hockey League Boston Bruins said Friday night he believes if the Bruins had had Terry Sawchuk last season they might have won 10 or 11 more games.

Commenting on the trade which brought Sawchuk and three other Detroit players to Boston in return for five Bruins, Patrick said his team had needed a good goal tender "in the worst way."

"Last year we had 21 tie games and I believe if we had Sawchuk we might have won 10 or 11 of them," he said. Patrick said he plans to farm Johnny Horenstein, who shared Boston's goal tending with the now-retired Jim Henry last season, to Hershey of the American League.

Boston Coach Milt Schmidt said "we gave a lot away in Edie Sandrod, our captain, Horenstein and Godfrey, but we had to do it to get a top-notch goalie."

BROOKLYN (AP)—The St. Louis Cardinals paraded eight pitchers to the mound Friday night and equaled a National League record while the Brooklyn Dodgers and Duke Snider smothered the slugging ways for a 12-5 victory at Ebbets Field.

The league leaders belted starter Tom Poholsky for four runs in the first inning when Snider rapped his 17th homer and Roy Campanella got his 15th, and they never let up on the harassed Cardinal mound corps.

One ray of light came for St. Louis in the fifth inning when Stan Musial whacked the 300th homer of his career over the right field scoreboard with two mates aboard to spark a 4-run rally. That sent Johnny Podres, the Dodger starter, to the showers, and brought on Clem Labine who went the rest of the way. Musial's eighth homer of the year, and he joined a select group of 12 players who have hit 30 or more four baggers.

DETROIT (AP)—Ned Garver, winless in more than three weeks, scattered six hits and drove in two runs with a single and double while pitching the Detroit Tigers to a 7-2 victory over the Baltimore Orioles Friday night.

Cal Abrams, Orioles outfielder, collected three of the hits — a single, double and home run — and knocked in both of the losers' runs.

## To Unveil Memorial To Commonwealth Soldiers

LONDON (CP)—A white stone memorial, commemorating the sacrifice of almost 2,000 unknown Commonwealth soldiers in the Second World War, will be unveiled Sunday near the French town of Bayeux, Normandy.

Plans for some 850 British next-of-kin to attend the ceremony have been cancelled because of the national railway strike. Some Canadian relatives are expected to be on hand, however, and other Commonwealth countries will be represented.

The Duke of Gloucester will perform the unveiling. Among officials Canadian representatives

will be Veterans Minister Lapointe, Maj. J. W. Duncan, senior Protestant chaplain of the 1st Canadian Infantry Brigade group, stationed at Soest, Germany, and Brig. J. E. C. Pangman, representing the Canadian joint staff, London.

British officials will include War Minister Anthony Head and Sir Gladwyn Jebb, ambassador in Paris.

The memorial, designed by British architect Peter Herpworth, commemorates 1,639 soldiers and faces the entrance to Bayeux war cemetery which contains 4,713 graves.
