### Notes and Comments.

The unfortunate Russian Jews have, it appears, been subjected to a fresh hardship thousands of them, to escape persecution in Russia, endeavored to pass through Germany on their way to more liberal countries. But there has been issued an imperial decision from the German kaiser prohibiting all Russian Jews from crossing the German frontier. This decree cannot reach these miserable fugitives until they come in contact with the German authorities. Then they will be turned back. It is reported that they have been reported where they have been shot down like dogs for attempting to make their way across the borders in spite of the German edict. Truly, here is a case of the devil and the deep sea. The ancient persecutions of the Jews seem to be reviving in this year of our Lord 1892. We don't pull out their teeth, nor cut off their noses, but driving them to poverty and pushing them to a cheerless exile is not much better.

Canadian butter is "looking up" in the British market, owing to the Canadian Government's vigorous efforts, through Prof. Robertson, to establish the dairy system. Says the Glasgow Herald of April 13:

"Messrs. Clement & Son, of this city, who have also branches in London, Manchester and Newcastle, have just received a first shipment of 10,000 lbs. of winter-made creamery butter from Canada. Up till recently butter-making was regarded as an outside accomplishment by the Canadian farmer. He took it at odd moments, and if the truth must be told, the butter bore distinct evidence to the haphazard system in which it had been manufactured. Twelve months ago, however, the Government at Ottawa resolved that the industry should be put on a different and better footing. Experimental dairy stations were established in the several provinces so as to assist in the development of winter dairying; co-operative creameries were started, and other steps were taken so that Canadian butter might by-and-by take a position in the British and other markets similar to that occupied by Canadian cheese. Hearty support had been given to the movement by the farmers in the Dominion, and now, at the end of the first season, all concerned are thoroughly satisfied with the proceeds and prospects of the movement. On this side of the Atlantic the butter will be warmly welcomed. Not only is it excellent in quality, but its price is such as to recommend it to every household over the length and breadth of the land."

The Weeks says: The whole country will have learned with a degree of satisfaction that the Attorney-General of the new Quebec Government has instituted legal proceedings in the criminal courts against ex-Premier Mercier. The charge is that of conspiracy to defraud Her Majesty, the Queen, that is to say, legal fiction, the Province of Quebec—of the sum of \$60,000. If it can be proved that Mr. Mercier really was guilty of such a crime, there certainly is no good reason why he should not be brought to trial and punished just as any other man would be for a similar offence. The high position which he occupied and the high trust to which he was unfaithful increase rather than lessen the turpitude of his wrong-doing, and the exposure and punishment should be exemplary accordingly. We are sorry, however, to see it stated in one Quebec despatch that it is rumored that "if there should appear to be any reason to indicate that a jury could not be had in Quebec to do justice in the matter of the accusations against Mr. Mercier, an application will be made for a change of venue, in which case it is even possible that the trial may be removed from the Province of Quebec altogether." The change of venue in any case would be to be deprecated as a serious imputation upon the citizens of the capital city of the Province. But the mere rumor that the trial might take place out of the Province is one which should be promptly contradicted and repudiated by the authorities concerned. Such a thing would be an inconceivable insult to the Province and an outrage upon the rights of the accused. The idea that the people who have just condemned the deposed Premier so emphatically at the polls could not be trusted to do their duty in the matter of giving him a fair trial and a just verdict is little less than absurd.

Most people suppose that the manufacture of tobacco consists merely of taking the leaf and pressing and pressing it into plugs. The fact is, however, that the process is a very delicate one, and the least false step will injure the flavor. The leaf must be carefully attended to for months after it leaves the planter's hand. It must neither dry too quickly or too slowly. Even after it has reached the factory the utmost delicacy of manipulation is required. The weather must be carefully studied, for if there is too much moisture in the air when it is pressed it will mould, and the same will happen if too much moisture is sprinkled upon it for the purpose of opening the leaf. Again, if it is over-dried in the oven it will turn crisp, and will nip the tongue in smoking. It is by careful attention to all these points that the "Myrtle Navy" has been brought to such perfection.

AFTER DAMAGES. Mr. J. J. Stewart, editor of the Halifax Herald, has entered an action for damages for libel against Joseph Matheson, a member of the Nova Scotia Legislature for Richmond. The alleged libel was contained in a speech.

ATTEMPTED TRAIN WRECKING.—A bold attempt was made to wreck the W. C. R. train on Saturday evening on its way from Annapolis to Yarmouth, by three Indian boys, aged respectively, seven, nine and thirteen, near Brass Lake. They had lashed to the track a pile of stones, a sleeper and a fence pole. These were seen by one of the train hands in time to prevent a catastrophe. The boys from the way in which they lingered near the spot were suspected, and upon being arrested admitted their guilt. The boys were lodged in jail. At the preliminary examination the eldest of the three told the prosecuting lawyer "Me want to kill white man, get some money to buy candy."

### News Notes.

It is rumored that the Quebec government proposes to reduce the sessional allowance of members from \$800 to \$600. Another step in the direction of economy will be the withdrawal of the franking privileges which members now enjoy at the expense of the province.

The fear that the Maritime attendance at the later Provincial Teachers' Association at Montreal in July would be slim, has been dispelled by word from New Brunswick and Nova Scotia to the effect that the summer schools in those provinces would be postponed in order to permit the teachers to attend the convention. Some 2,000 teachers are expected to be present, and a fine exhibit of school work and teaching appliances will be seen.

A tin cylinder with a fuse attached was found between the colonnades of the Foreign Office at Brussels a few nights ago. This discovery created great alarm, which was intensified by the news from Liege, where two dynamite cartridges exploded in the evening, one in the residence of Senator Deley, and the other in the residence of his son. These explosions caused serious damage. Later another explosion occurred in the choir of St. Martin's Church, by which stained windows valued at \$20,000 were shattered into fragments, and hundreds of panes of glass in adjacent houses were smashed. A fourth cartridge with a spent fuse was discovered later. A feeling of wild panic prevails.

ON THE MOVE.—A gang of burglars and fire bugs appear to be travelling through parts of Nova Scotia. A few nights ago an effort was made to burglarize the Western Counties railway station at Yarmouth. The would-be burglar fired three shots at the night watchman and then escaped in the darkness.

AGAINST THE CITY.—Among the cases decided on Monday by the Supreme Court of Canada, was that of Mr. James J. Christie vs. the city of St. John. This action was originally brought against the city of Portland (before the union of the cities), and was instituted by Mr. Christie to recover damages for injuries sustained by him in falling through a rotten plank on the Strait Shore road in the year 1887. The case was twice tried at the St. John circuit, and at the first trial Mr. Christie obtained a verdict for \$700. The city appealed for a new trial, which was granted. At the second trial the plaintiff obtained a verdict for \$1500. The city then appealed to the Supreme Court of Canada, which dismissed the appeal.

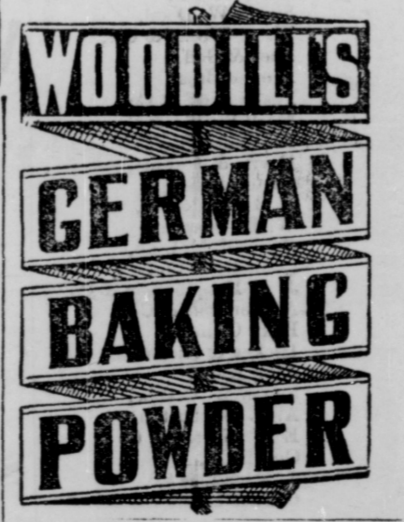
