**Fifth Prince Conservatives In Annual Meeting**

**Attended Meetings On Educational Subjects In N. B.**

Dr. L. W. Shaw returned on Monday after having attended two annual meetings dealing with education in the Maritime Provinces. At Fredericton the Central Advisory committee on education assembled in the University of New Brunswick, where heads of universities and "Department of Education heads met with teacher training leaders to discuss matters of common interest to the Atlantic Provinces.  
 Subjects under consideration included the matriculation requirements as set down by the universities; how the secondary schools can properly gain pupils for matriculation, and the place of the university in the life of the country. Dr. Shaw was asked to give an account of his trip to the Congress at Geneva last summer, with a report of the proceedings at the meetings there. Dr. York from the University of Maine was present and on invitation took part in the discussions. Dr. Watson Kirkconnell, President of Acadia University, presided at the meetings.  
 Dr. Shaw and Dr. Frank MacKinnon, principal of Prince of Wales College were guests of the University of New Brunswick as the island delegates to the conference. Dr. Shaw later attended the annual meeting of Atlantic Provinces Examining Board which met at Mount Allison University, Sackville. This Board sets and reads examinations for Grades 11 and 12. Reports for the year's activities were presented and discussed. Plans were made for setting and reading the examinations in June 1953. Mr. Malcolm MacKenzie, Director of Curriculum, Charlottetown, and Mr. Elmer Pineau, of the Summerside High School, represented the secondary school teachers of the Province at the Sackville meeting.  
 Dr. Shaw was also requested to talk on his Geneva trip at this meeting, which was presided over by Professor Mowat of the Education Department, Dalhousie University.

**Freighter Grounds Is Refloated**

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Nov. 19—(CP)—The Norwegian freighter Benca, buffeted by three Atlantic gales during a 10-day tour here by the Halifax tug Foundation Lillian, was pulled off Pancake Rock tonight after grounding off the harbor entrance.  
 A St. John's tug, the Glenmont, teamed up with the Lillian to free the stricken freighter from the rocky shallows at the landlocked harbor mouth.  
 The Benca was later towed in to a berth.  
 Details of the grounding were not immediately available.  
 The Lillian took the Benca in tow after the freighter ran out of fuel 10 days ago. Three autumn storms dogged the vessels' progress on what normally should have been a three-day trip.

**Governor-General Postpones Trip**

OTTAWA, Nov. 19—(CP)—Governor-General Vincent Massey, advised by his doctors to rest, has postponed a planned pre-Christmas trip to the Northwest Territories, the only part of Canada he has not visited.  
 Government House made the announcement today. It said the 65-year-old Governor-General has postponed the trip "on doctor's orders" but hopes to make it in the near future. Earlier this year Mr. Massey made extended trips to the Maritimes and the West.  
 A spokesman said the announcement is not to be construed as meaning the Governor-General is ill. He is not cancelling other engagements.  
 Tomorrow he will open a new session of Parliament, reading the Speech from the Throne in the Senate chamber at 3 p.m. EST.

**Attended Fishery Ass'n Meeting**

Messrs S.H. Burhoe of Charlottetown and Frank Cameron of Summerside, delegate members of the P.E. Island Fisheries Federation to a meeting of the Fish Association in the Maritimes held at Moncton, N.B. on Tuesday, report a well attended and representative meeting at which definite overtures to the Federal Government were agreed upon.  
 These included amended regulations under the Fisheries Inspection Act and the meat and canned food's act" and "Factory and storage inspection of fresh and frozen lobster meats. The most important aspect to P.E. Island packers and fishermen is a proposed adjustment of can weights for all types of packs to enable every producer in the industry to have a fair chance to compete in the domestic and American markets.  
 "This is a long range view," said Mr. Burhoe in discussing the Moncton conference last evening, to keep all phases of the lobster industry healthy, and to insure our fishermen, constant prices at a high level."  
 The submission by the Fish Association will be made through Manager O'Brien of the Fisheries Council at Ottawa to the Government in the usual way at an early date.

**To Charge Former U. S. Army Censor**

PORT MEADE, Md., Nov. 19—(AP)—The United States army announced today it has decided to press court-martial charges against Lt.-Col. Melvin Voorhes, former army censor in Korea, for a book he wrote about the fighting there.  
 The charges are he failed to submit a manuscript to the Department of Army for review and disregarded the order of his commanding officer to withdraw the book from publication.  
 The book, "Korean Tales," was published Armistice Day As Voorhes himself put it, he "took a slap at a large part of the correspondents' corps, which I felt was violating security and endangering lives."

**\$50,000 Damage In Ferry Grounding**

VANCOUVER, Nov. 19—(CP)—The Canadian Pacific Steamships' ferry Princess of Nanaimo, which crashed into Nanaimo's waterfront last night, arrived back here today under her own power.  
 She will be drydocked for further examination. Divers found no apparent underwater damage today.  
 The 6,200-ton Nanimo shattered floats and fishing boats after overshooting her pier by 100 yards. Damage was estimated at \$50,000.  
 Company officials said a snapped cable prevented signals from reaching the engine room's electrical relays from the bridge. Instead of reversing her engines as she neared her berth, she continued ahead at "dead slow" speed. She bedded into the mud but was refloated at high tide today.

FUSAN, Korea, Nov. 17—(Reuters)—American and South Korean police search today for eight cans of cyanide—enough to kill 20,000 people—stolen from a United States chemical unit here. The chemical was to have been used for killing insects.  
 Also killed in the collision 18 miles east of here was Rodney Palfrey, a passenger in the Goslett car. Mrs. Goslett, her 18-month-old son and James Doyle of Warapitel near Sudbury were in hospital for varying periods.
