Churchill Gave the 'The Making of History'

Sir Winston Churchill gave a
style to history as it happened.

He had two basic systems
for getting the most work done:
During the war he stayed
in bed in the morning as long
as he could and worked there,

He was Churchill in 1919, as
defence secretary, who batted
the British against the Weimar
Republic by sending help to the
White Russians in their fight against
the Bolsheviks of Lenin, Stalin and
Trotsky.

It was a poetry thought-out
project. The British, who were
afraid he would get them into
armies, and the Russians com-
munist never forgive him.

JOURNALIST FIRST
While Churchill has his
career as a soldier in 1885 in India
it was as a journalist in those
days officers could act as cor-
respondents for newspapers—

He became so well known that
in 1900 he ran for a seat in the
House and was elected. He has
been there ever since with the
exception of two years in the
1920s when his prestige hit bot-
tom.

As early as 1906 Churchill at-
tacked Marxist-socialism when
there wasn't any Communist
party in the world. He was the
first to create a state and kept
on attacking through the
1920s.

But in the war, when Britain's
back was against the wall and
the German attack on Russia
was in the air, he was the only
one who was not afraid to say
what he thought.

He was the only one who was

The crocodile snapped when

Prime Minister Chamberlain
was banished.

He believed in spreading
the work. "I never do any brain
work," he said, "that anyone
else can do for me."

In the First World War Churchill
was blamed, although not alone,
for the British disaster at the
Dardanelles where the
Royal Navy tried to smash the
Turkish forces and drive them out
of the war.

He was the first to propose
the idea of a "People's Peace"
which would have been a
political disaster. He was

Weather Slows Search For Ship

others arrived safely at Port
aux Basques.
