Thoughts For Our Time

OBEDIENCE TO GOD MUST BE FOUNDATION

If we are to judge by the educational reports, by the articles written by learned jurists, and by the latest discussions of the child psychologists, we are witnessing a return to the affirmation of discipline and obedience as the basic formative influence in the molding of character.

This new emphasis on control is in part a reaction from the extremes of the so-called "progressives" in education, in part a reaction to the increase in juvenile delinquency.

In general, we can only feel a deep satisfaction as we read such articles as that of Judge Elijah Adlow in the July issue of The Atlantic Monthly, in which that experienced jurist pleads for the restoration of sound family life based on authority and discipline. One sentence out of many in that article is worth quoting:

"We must recapture the spirit of the home which our parents and grandparents knew; a young people must be brought up and not left to bring themselves up."

In order that the parent or the teacher, exercise authority and enforce discipline with full effectiveness however, it is essential that there be a consciousness of the nature and source of authority, as well as of the purpose of authority. As St. Paul tells us, there is no power but from God. And all human authority is but a share in the Divine Authority which He guides the movements of all created things.

Inanimate and irrational beings are guided by the law of their nature which God in His wisdom has implanted in them, and which they cannot but obey. Rational beings, however, men and angels have freedom, that wonderful ability to choose to serve God out of love.

All human societies are organized, just as the whole of creation is organized, for the glory of God. Man fulfills his part in giving glory to God by developing to full human and supernatural perfection. Hence the organization of the home first of all, then political states and even international organizations.

NEED LAW ORDER. We know that without order and law and the exercise of authority in any organization, from a football team to the United Nations, there is chaos, and the end or purpose of that organization cannot be attained; the growth in perfection of the individuals or the states which constitute that society is never achieved.

But when a father or mother, for instance, can exercise well the authority which God has shared with him, they themselves

develop the proper attitude to authority if the immediate human agent of that authority is realistic in rebuke or sarcasm.

The continual and firm pressure or a calm and strong personality, the example of a parent or teacher whose ideals of goodness never vary and are never compromised, but who, at the same time, is never "shocked", or surprised into a fit of temper by the disobedience of a child, is the firmest support a child can have in the development of a sense of truly understanding obedience.

And finally, those who exercise authority should not hesitate to invoke punishments for the breaking of the law or disobedience to a command. God, knowing our weakness, warns us of the fires of hell. And parents and teachers fail in their exercise of authority if they fail to punish the child for disobedience.

Again, however, this must never be done in anger, or because the parent or teacher has himself been irritated; rather the child must understand that the punishment is administered only as a deterrent to future hardship, and because a serious offense against authority,

God's authority, has been committed. Judge Adlow, whose article was quoted above, sums up the results of the wise exercise of authority in the home: "The position of the parent must be restored to its former place of authority, and the child be asserted with kindness when possible, and severity when necessary. Then, and only then, will character thrive and the foundation be laid for a law-abiding society."
