**U. S. Casualties Highest Since July**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22 (AP)—The Defence Department today announced the highest weekly United States casualty toll in the Korean war since the week ended July 2nd. The total for the week ended last Friday was 963. This raised the total U. S. casualties in the Korean fighting to 122,117, including 19,184 killed.

**As Newsmen See Situation**

The way newspaper men see things in the west, California, Wyoming, Colorado, Montana, Nevada, and Oregon probably would go Republican if this were election day. Those six states have 54 of the 79 electoral votes for the whole area. Each state is allotted a number of electoral votes equal to the total of congressmen it sends to Washington. The candidate who carries his state's popular vote—even by the smallest margin—wins the election. Classed as doubtful with some advantage for Eisenhower are New Mexico and Idaho with four each.

of those who got G.G. In the first week after injections, there were 12 paralytic polio cases among G.G. children, 10 among getlain ones. In the second week, G.G. showed highly significant protection. Only three G.G. children became paralytic, compared with 23 in the other group. So 20 children were "apparently spared paralytic polio," Dr. Hammon said. In the third to fifth weeks, only three G.G. children became paralytic, as against 15 in the getlain group, a difference of 12.

**Loses, Power Quickly**

In the sixth to 10th weeks, eight children in the G.G. group developed paralysis, as against 10 in the getlain group as G.G. began apparently to lose some protective power.

G.G. apparently made paralysis milder. Of the paralyzed youngsters who had received G.G., half recovered completely within a month or so. In the same period, there were no complete recoveries among youngsters receiving getlain.

G.G. was used because monkey tests showed the polio virus goes to the blood before it enters nerves to damage them and cause sickness.

G.G. counteracts the virus while it is still in the blood. Some children may have received G.G. too late to halt the virus there. The shot can't do any good after nerves have been attacked.

The ultimate answer to controlling polio is a vaccine containing polio virus in killed or safe form to make people produce longer lasting antibodies. Hopes for a vaccine are brightening, O'Connor said.
