Clean Up Discussed; Town Wages Raised

GEORGETOWN — The Georgetown Council met to discuss clean up week and the resignation of the police officer Monday night with Mayor H. S. MacLean presiding and five of the six councillors in attendance.

Reports were presented from the various committees. With Councillor Lavers reporting on finance, Councillor MacLean on streets and sidewalks, Councillor MacDonald on fire hall, Councillor Currie on street lights and welfare, and Councillor Johnson on police and sanitation.

The council declared the period from May 11 to May 18 would be clean-up week in the town and asked all citizens to co-operate to the fullest extent in cleaning up their properties.

After the 14th the sanitization committee will proceed to have any rubbish that remains on private property removed and the owner charged the costs of removal.

The resignation of the town policeman, William Menzies, was accepted by the council and is to be effective as of May 21. The matter of future policing of the town will be taken up at a meeting of the council May 17th. Negotiations are still being carried on in Ottawa in the hope of obtaining the services of a member of the RCMP to police Georgetown.

Ice Closes On Traps Heavy Losses Possible

GEORGETOWN — Lobster fishermen in Georgetown and along the east coast of the province worked hard yesterday and slept little last night as heavy drift ice, the age-old enemy of the lobster fisherman, moved in over the east coast fishing grounds from Launching to the Northumberland Strait.

The ice started moving shoreward Monday evening and covered all of the outside fishing grounds and Boughton Island Reef. Veteran fishermen predicted that with the wind still north east and a rising tide that the heavier drift ice would move to the north of Georgetown Harbor by this morning.

Some of the fishermen on the outside grounds succeeded in replacing buoys with ice poles and the fishermen on the grounds near shore were working feverishly to get poles on their lines.

As boats came into Georgetown Harbor Tuesday evening, all of them carried quantities of

there is fear the ice may be deep enough under water to go aground on the reefs smashing thousands of traps. In any case the fishermen will be days after the ice moves off shore grappling for lines which have become cut off.

Very few lobsters have been landed to date at Georgetown and Montague and for them the price is reported to be 55 cents and 60 cents per pound. There is no insurance of catch loss and if ice remains in the area, thousands of dollars in equipment and harvest could be lost.

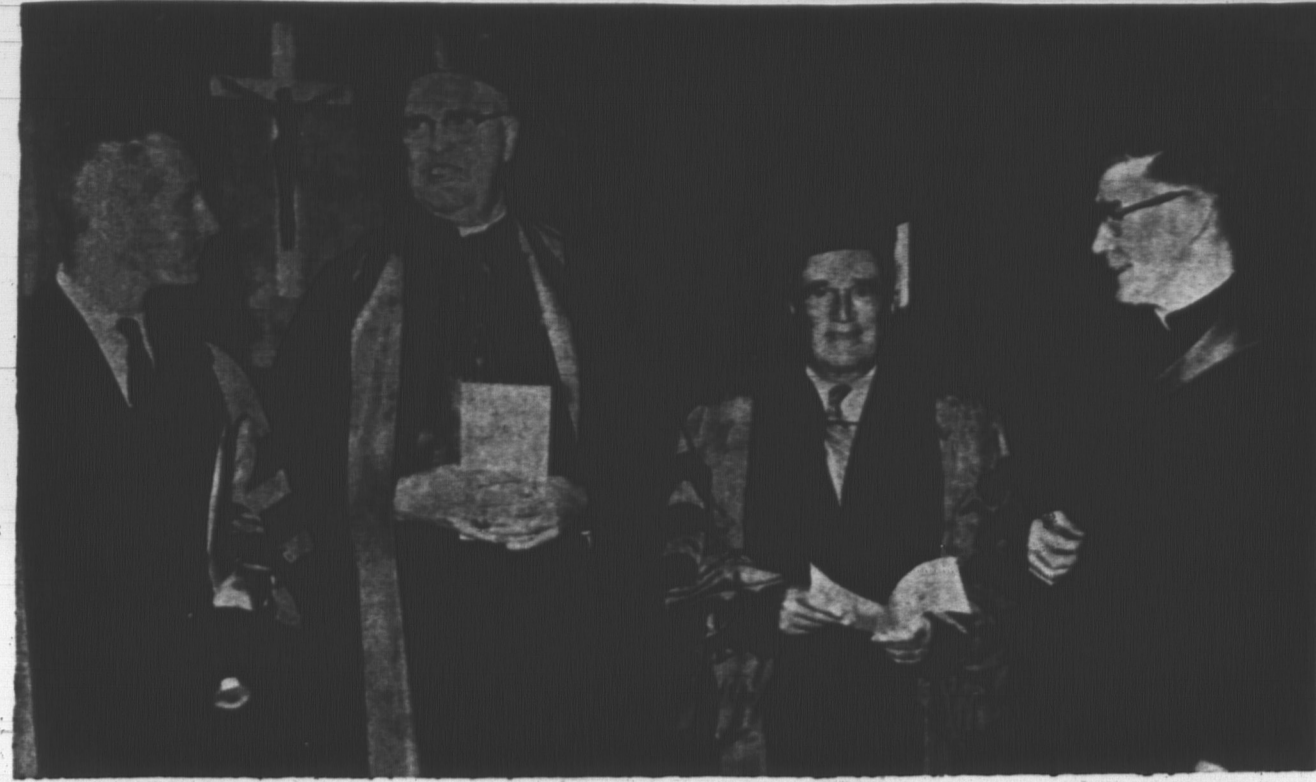
CEYLON CATCHES FISH

Three Honorary Degrees Awarded During Annual SDU Convocation

A university president, a historian, and a supreme court judge received honorary Doctor of Laws degrees at the annual convocation of St. Dunstan's University yesterday afternoon.

Dr. Colin Bridges Mackay, Fredericton, Dr. Joseph Henri Blanchard, Charlottetown and Mr. Justice Mark Rudolph MacGuigan, Charlottetown, were presented with the degrees by university chancellor Most Rev. Malcolm A. MacEachern.

In reading the citation accompanying Dr. Mackay's degree, SDU president Rt. Rev. George Macdonald said Dr. Mackay had been responsible for much progress and expansion in the University of New Brunswick since taking over its presidency in 1953 as "the youngest Canadian University president in history."

He spoke of his "energy and administrative capacity" and briefly outlined his career as a naval officer, lawyer and teacher. Dr. Mackay holds honorary degrees from Dalhousie University of New Brunswick, Laval, and Colby in Maine.

"The community that neglects its heroes neglects its ideals," Rev. Adrian Arsenault said in giving the citation for Dr. Blanchard — first in French, then English Dr. Blanchard, educated at Prince of Wales College, St. Dunstan's the Ontario Agricultural College and the Sorbonne, taught for half a century and spent many hours in archives doing research for his book on the history of Prince Edward Island. He holds honorary degrees from Dalhousie University of Moncton. His contribution has been "nothing short of awesome," Father Arsenault said.

"I am confident that this same sort of thing can and should take place on Prince Edward Island and I would hope that the obvious success of our experiment in co-operative living might dispel any uneasiness here in regard to the sound recommendations of your Royal Commission on Higher Education," he said.

"If the mechanical needs of our technical age cannot be acquired singly then they should be secured cooperatively. And if here, there are sufficient numbers of prospective students to develop a strong undergraduate program then let them come from the other provinces," he said.

Indeed there is a need for "student bodies that are cosmopolitan in make up," Dr. Mackay maintained. "Let's have Canadians from every province represented in increasing numbers on the campuses of every university in Canada."

MARITIME SCHIZOPHRENIA

Basing his observations mainly on the CBC radio interview series "The Canadian Mood," Dr. Mackay spoke of "an almost schizophrenic approach to the years ahead" on the part of Maritimers, at least those interviewed on the program.

"They admit the need for industrialization and economic growth; they want tidal power, a causeway, mines, mills and smelters, but not at the sacrifice of any change in their present settled and sedentary state. They speak wistfully of the benefits of bigness, but they don't want growth if it is to bring with it the dehumanizing effects which are seen in so many North American cities and which to date our Maritime Provinces have managed to avoid."

Dr. Mackay suggested that with a cooperative effort, the Maritimes might be able to reach both goals — the growth and the stability. "We should share our unique individuality and thus make certain that we maintain mastery over the machine," he said.
