A TERRIBLE DEATH.—Arthur Collins, of Springfield, Mass., thirteen years old, met with a terrible death last Monday evening. In company with some other boys he had climbed upon an embankment when he caught hold of a live wire. The shock threw him backward, and he fell several feet, striking on the back of his neck, breaking it and causing death.

SUBBEN DEATHS.—Wellington Turner, a prominent farmer of Waterville, King's County, N. S., dropped dead last Wednesday evening. He was about 45 years of age.

Mrs James Brennan, of Newport Corner, Hunt's County, N. S., fell dead while milking a cow on Wednesday. She was 50 years of age. Heart disease is supposed to have been the cause of death in both cases.

MORE SEX PHENOMENA.—Mr. Isaiah Horne, of Souris, who it will be remembered, saw in last March a most peculiar sex phenomenon, reports that he had a repetition of his former experience on the 20th of last month. On that day he again observed what he supposed to be black balls, varying in size from a cannon ball to a bullet, dropping from the sun. He called a neighbor's attention to the spectacle, and the latter, in his astonishment and alarm at the unusual sight, sought a place of safety.

COURTSHIP UNDER DIFFICULTIES.—A Deer Island man, who is well-known at Bocabe, while enjoying a moonlight stroll with a gentle Bocabe maiden a few evenings ago, was interrupted by the stalwart brothers of the young woman, and was obliged to draw a revolver to save himself from injury. The next day the parties engaged in a rough and tumble fight on the beach. They rolled over and over in the sand and gravel for half an hour or so and then an armistice was declared. 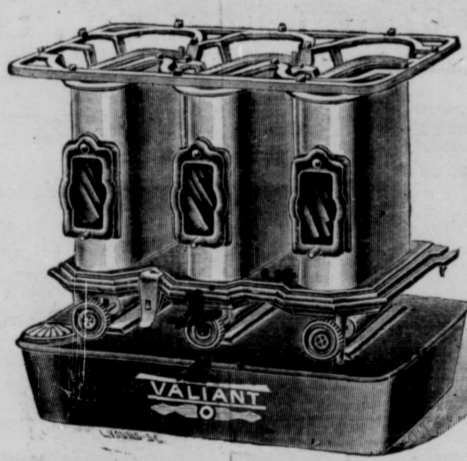
