"Five and 1/2 grams of instant onion, or a scant standard tablespoonful, is the equivalent of 1 minced peeled medium onion," I added.

HOW IT IS SOLD
"Instant onion is sold in foil envelopes, each containing 5 1/2 grams. It is also on sale less expensively in small glass jars. I sincerely hope this fine and helpful product will soon be available in larger jars, which should lower the price more nearly to that of fresh onion."

"The stuffed baked sweet potatoes you just prepared, Chef," I went on, "are exceptional. A welcome change from the overworked candied variety.

"By adding sour cream and that touch of instant onion, you created a sweet potato dish in the gourmet class."

Measurements level recipes for 6

Stuffed Baked Sweet Potatoes: Bake 3 good-sized sweet potatoes in hot oven, 400 degrees F., for 50 min., or until fork-tender. Halve lengthwise. Scoop out pulp save skins. Mash smooth. Add 2 1/2 c. dairy sour cream, 2 tbsp. room-soft butter or mar-

garine and 1/4 tsp. salt. Beat vigorously until fluffy.

Stir in 3 tbsp. chopped parsley and 2 tsp. instant minced onion. Pile lightly back into sweet potato skins. Brush with melted butter.

Heat in hot oven, 400 degrees F., 20 min. or until lightly browned.

TOMORROW'S DINNER
Tomato - Green Pepper Soup
Veal - Pork Loaf Creamed Peas
Stuffed Baked Sweet Potatoes
Tossed Lettuce - Cress Salad
Blueberry Cobbler
Coffee Tea Milk
Veal - Pork Loaf: In saucepan simmer in 1/2 c. milk, 3/4 c. soft enriched bread crumbs until pasty. Mix into 1 lb. each tender veal and fresh pork, ground together twice. Add 1 egg, 1/4 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. pepper, 1-16 tsp. nutmeg, 1 tsp. poultry seasoning, 1 tsp. instant minced onion and 1/2 tbsp. parsley flakes.
Pack into oiled 5" by 9" pan.

Bake 1 hr. in mod. oven, 350-375 degrees F.
Let stand 5 min. before unmolding.

TRICK OF CHEF
If adding instant onion to a moist mixture such as mashed potato, sauce or soup, use "as is."

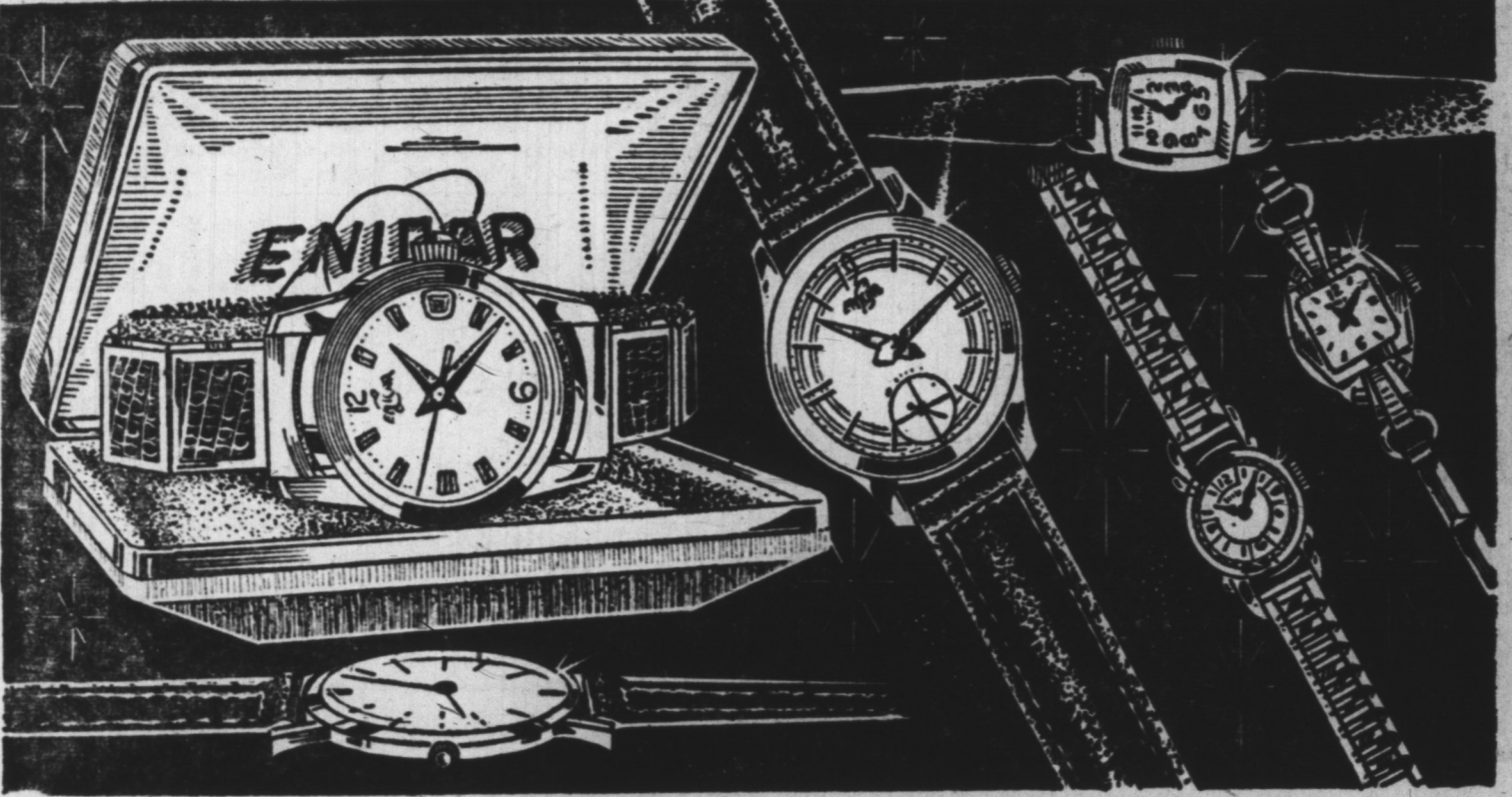
