St. John Fire.

Subscriptions Raised. Incendiarism Rampant.

(Special dispatch to Daily Examiner.)

HALIFAX, June 26.

Halifax subscriptions amount to twenty-three thousand dollars, and a vast stock of clothing is being prepared to send to St. John. Incendiarism were at work in Portland (St. John) last night. Fuel was found laid with devilish intent. The twenty thousand sufferers of St. John have been supplied with substantial food.

Sr. Jons, June 23.

Every man willing to work at clearing away the ruins receives 50 or 75 cents per day. Matters here are fast settling down to a determined effort to build up the city as quickly as possible.

The closing of all the bar rooms has had a very good effect on the order of the city, and few or no drunken men are to be seen about. It is believed that the accident to the Sussex train, on Saturday evening, owing to a misplaced switch, was the work of train wreckers. Contributions, both in money and provisions, are still pouring in from all sides.

It was reported yesterday that the city of London had subscribed £100,000 in aid of the St. John sufferers, and that Liverpool merchants were prepared to buy St. John debentures to the amount of £100,000, so that the work of rebuilding properties might be proceeded with immediately. A prominent banking official was called upon by a news reporter to ascertain what truth was in the report. He stated that he was only in a position to speak of the matter as a street rumor, but that another banking gentleman, who was absent from the city, had information on the question there is little doubt, therefore, the rumor is correct.

Mr. Marshall received a dispatch from England, yesterday, saying that the Imperial's \$300,000 loss would be promptly paid, and authorizing him to contribute £500 to the Relief Fund.

Mr. Titon telegraphs that the Corporation of Ottawavoted \$5,000, \$2,000 available to-morrow, and there are scores of other instances which indicate the widespread sympathy for the stricken city. I may mention the despatch of 50 cases of cooked meat from Chicago, and the subscription of \$500 by Sayer & Co, Cognac, France.

Nearly all the persons who were burnt out have received shelter. Many families who belonged to Lower Cove have received lodgings at the Anchor Line warehouse, and at the warehouse on Charlotte Street Extension. Every house in the city of Portland and Carleton is taken up. The most destitute of the sufferers are gathered in the Rink.

It is said that 100 pickpockets have arrived in town from the United States.

The Royal Canadian expresses its intention of paying of its \$276,000 immediately. The Stadacona admits that its losses will amount to \$270,000.

About \$200,000 in cash have been received up to the present for relief purposes.

The "Argus" arrived this morning from Halifax.

Anderson, who was injured by the blasting accident, died this morning.

Michael Donohoe, died from burns received at the fire; and Mrs. Fitzgerald from fright on the night of the fire.

There was great excitement for a time among people here over a rumor of a great fire in Halifax, which was circulated to-day.

OTTAWA, June 24.

Earl Carnarvon sends the following telegram—"I am commanded by the Queen to express the great sorrow with which she has heard of the terrible calamity that has befallen the city of St. John, and her sympathy for the sufferers."

The Ottawa Board of Trade voted \$5000 for the sufferers, and the County Council, \$1000.

It is rumored that the registrar of the neighboring county and his son are missing, leaving a defalcation of \$26,000.

Sr. Jons, June 25.

Mr. Scott, Dominion Architect, is making arrangements for the immediate reconstruction of all Government buildings. This will give employment to many men now out of work.

Mr. James Gordon has been at work to-day clearing away the bricks from the site of his late four story building on Prince William Street. He intends rebuilding at once. About two thirds of his loss is covered.

All the clerks in St. John have decided to aid their former employers in removing the debris.

It was rumored this morning that London has offered St. John money at two per cent. for rebuilding purposes.

An excited constable shot at two men, and has been deprived of his authority.

Between three and four thousand persons were relieved to-day, including many frauds who imposed on the committee.

The Custom House vaults were opened to-day and the contents were found to be all right.

It has been discovered that the Nisi Prius and County Court records and seals were destroyed.

Temporary buildings are rapidly going

up. Many contracts have been signed for the erection of fine buildings.

The "Argus" men's efforts to blow down walls continue with little success.

Among the safes opened to-day, the contents of Daniel & Boyd's, Hutchinson-jeweller, De la Torre & Co., Stadacona Company, were entirely destroyed.

Two attempts to-day at incendiarism were made in Portland. A guard kept in front of one building prevented its destruction by its owner.

The New Brunswick Bank treasure has been removed under a military guard to new quarters.

THE WAR!

ACROSS THE DANUBE.

LONDON, June 25.—The crossing of the Danube at Ibrai by the Russians was unopposed. They have advanced into Turkish territory and captured several strongholds after desperate fighting.

LONDON, June 23.

Taken in connection with the *Scotman's* announcement, the following remark in the *Post's* leading editorial is significant:—"In anticipation of the time when it may be needful to assume a strong defensive position, it will doubtless become the duty of the Government to ask for certain means of giving effect to the wishes of the nation. It may be necessary to study the difficulties which are to be encountered in a voyage from Portsmouth to Gallipoli."

A Cabinet Council was held yesterday. The Earl of Beaconsfield afterwards had an audience with the Queen at Windsor Castle.

LONDON, June 23.

A Citinge correspondent telegraphs yesterday that Sultan Pasha advances very slowly, the road being obstinately contested by the Montenegrins. No doubt he will succeed in getting through; but with very great losses. According to latest reports he had 22,000 regulars, and from 5,000 to 8,000 irregulars, against whom Prince Nicholas can only oppose 8,000 to 10,000 men. Fighting is reported sanguinary, but the Turks can only return now with great danger, and will push forward regardless of losses.

A telegram to John Boyd, Esq., says the magnificent sum of \$70,000 has been collected by private subscription in Toronto.

Mayor Pritchard, of London, Ont., telegraphs that at a special meeting of the City Council, \$5,000 had been voted for the sufferers.
