

Unanticipated Expansion Surprises Many Economists

OTTAWA (CP)—Don't be too surprised to see the Canadian economy in 1956 turning out goods and services at the annual rate of \$29,000,000,000.

This would be far higher than the government's brightest forecasts. It would be about \$1,000,000,000 higher than predicted by Finance Minister Harris; about \$1,400,000,000 higher than last year's record, and even \$700,000,000 higher than the 1955 first-quarter annual rate of \$28,000,000,000.

But, informants say, that in fact is the way production is shaping up. And the official April-June second-quarter figures, to be published in about two weeks, likely will tell the story.

Part of the rise results from the estimated higher-than-average grain crop; part from general price increases, and part from the plain fact that industry is turning out goods at a faster pace than previously anticipated.

Some of the unanticipated expansion bears a touch of price inflation but informants estimate that the major part of the overall increase is due to a greater volume of goods and services.

The higher the rise in national production, the greater the possible surplus in the federal treasury, Mr. Harris, in his March budget, predicted a budget surplus of \$113,000,000 for the 1955-57 fiscal year which ends next March 31. Authorities have estimated that the surplus may actually reach

some \$300,000,000. That was based on the growth in the Gross National Product—the value of goods and services produced.

In the January-March period of 1956, national production swept ahead of all predictions, increasing to the annual rate of \$28,300,000,000.

This surprised some federal authorities. They expected there might be a tapering off in later months, reducing the annual average closer to the \$28,000,000,000 forecast.

But apparently production made even further advances in the April-June period. The rise was unofficially estimated at between two and three per cent, bringing the annual rate to about \$29,000,000,000.

Orange Blossom Buns

1. Scald 1/2 cup milk. Stir in 1/2 cup granulated sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup shortening. Cool to lukewarm.

2. Meantime, measure into bowl 1/2 cup lukewarm water. Stir in 1 teaspoon granulated sugar. Sprinkle with contents of 2 envelopes Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast. Let stand 10 minutes, THEN stir well. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture and 2 well-beaten eggs. 1 tablespoon grated orange rind.

4. Punch down dough. Halve the dough, form each half into an 8-inch roll. Cut each roll into 8 equal pieces; form into smooth balls. Place in greased muffin pans. Brush with melted butter or margarine. Cover. Let rise until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour. Dip 16 cubes of sugar one at a time, into a lukewarm orange juice and press a cube into top of each bun. Bake in a moderately hot oven, 375°, about 25 minutes. Yield—16 buns.

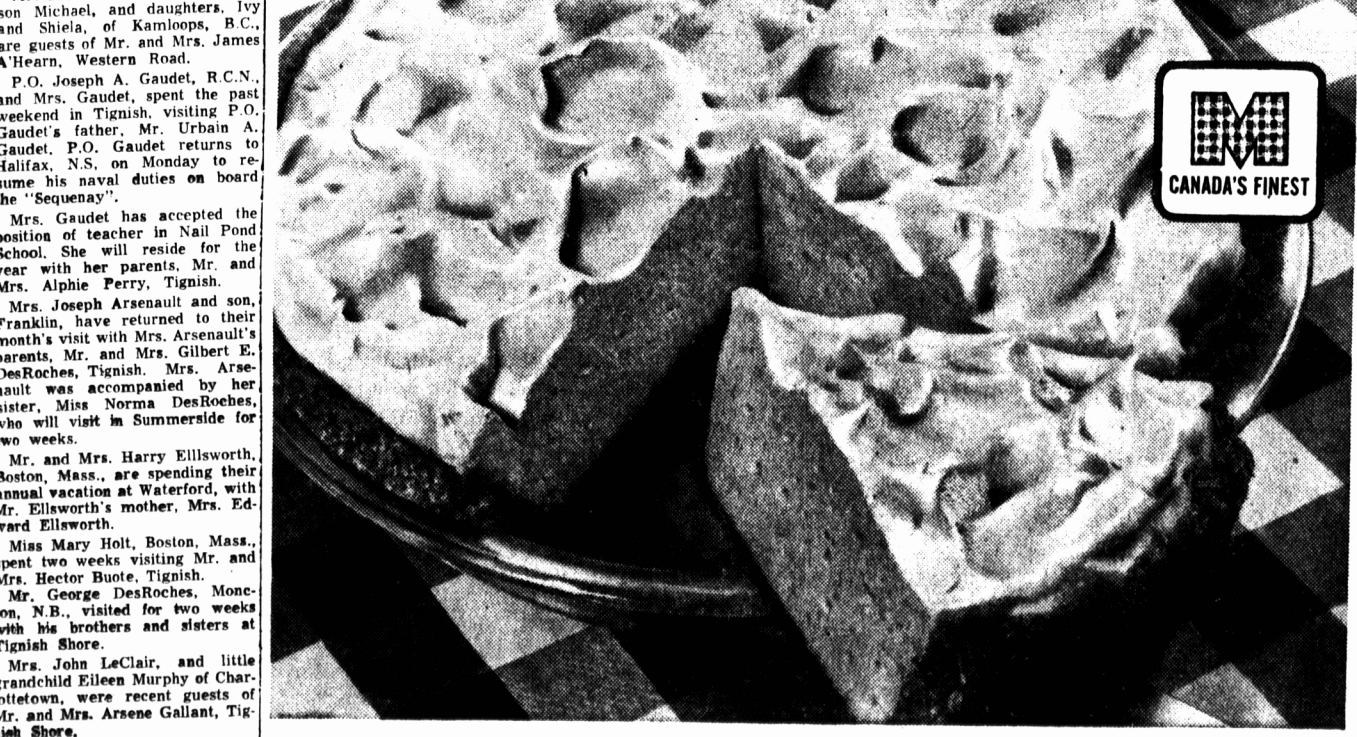
