

Uniform Held Fashionable By Indonesian Populace

JAKARTA, (AP)—The new look in Indonesia is militant and a uniform is decidedly fashionable for both men and women. The militant look had its roots in martial law declared in 1957 and enforced until 1963. It really blossomed, however, following the attempted Communist coup here last Oct. 1, a coup crushed within hours by the army.

Since then, military and Communist rivalry had existed but not in the same way as before. The army, seeing a chance to eradicate the Communists, increased its advantage. Troops organized and supported the people in a massive search and slaughter operation that killed thousands of Communists. The army immediately began filling all positions previously held by Communists or sympathizers with army men so that most top positions in the government now are held by the army, beginning with army commander Lt. Gen. Suharto and the former defence minister Gen. Abdul Harris Nasution.

These two men are in effective command of the country and are consolidating their position by steady removal of all who do not give total, unquestioning loyalty. In their place, army officers

LIBERATED FROM REDS
 At the moment, the people show no resentment toward the army for they feel it was the troops who liberated them from the Communist control. They believe the army will run the country with more liberalism and put the chaotic economy back into some semblance of order.

But how long good relations with the soldiers will last has become a nagging question, particularly in view of the increasing reports of military violence. One Western embassy official told how he saw an army truck accidentally run into a civilian car at a crossing. Two soldiers got out and beat up the driver. Then they took rifles to the car, smashing all the windows and slashing the seats.

Armed soldiers have literally hijacked ships at the port near Jakarta. Soldiers also regularly take what they want from

shops, particularly those owned by Chinese. Nevertheless, the army is using its power to win more power. The real program begins in the small village where children, including girls, are taught how to march, fire a rifle and conduct field operations. One girl in central Java said she likes the drilling because it gives her a chance to meet and talk with her friends.

There is little recreation for

around the field. 1958 halt-action of militancy can be seen in Indonesia's students, a volatile, organized mass that carries great influence on government actions.

Student commando units have their own battalions which are the hard-core militants, the organizers and the enforcers. Para-military units, comprised of students and trained by professional soldiers, have also been organized.

The upsurge of militant organization in Indonesia is expected to continue as long as generals remain in control of the country and they have no challengers at the moment.

None spared. Indonesian militancy spares none. The wives of soldiers are expected to learn nearly as much as their husbands and work at it with surprising fervor. Women up to seven months pregnant march and drill with the rest, complete with combat boots, helmet and Russian zifle or sub-machine-gun.

Soviet Union Introducing 5-Day Week

MOSCOW, AP—The five-day work week is being introduced in an industrial region of the Soviet Union, Pravda said here. But apparently, the workers will still put in 41 hours weekly.

The Communist party newspaper said the shorter week is being launched on a large scale in Perm, an industrial area of 3,000,000 people in the northeastern part of European Russia.

Communist Party Leader Leonid Brezhnev announced in March at the 24th party congress that the whole country will be switched over to the five-day week by 1970.

Soviet workers have been putting in a six-day week—seven hours a day Monday through Friday and six hours on Saturday. Under the new setup, as far as can be learned, the total number of hours worked will remain the same. This apparently will be managed through longer shifts.

The Friday week is part of an over-all program to improve the working of the economy and the lot of the people. The collective leadership under Brezhnev seems bent on catching up with Western Europe and North America but through carefully thought-out changes and not the crash programs of Nikita Khrushchev's era.

Pravda said the five-day week increased by almost 100 per cent the experiment proved a great success, with production increased by almost 100 per cent.

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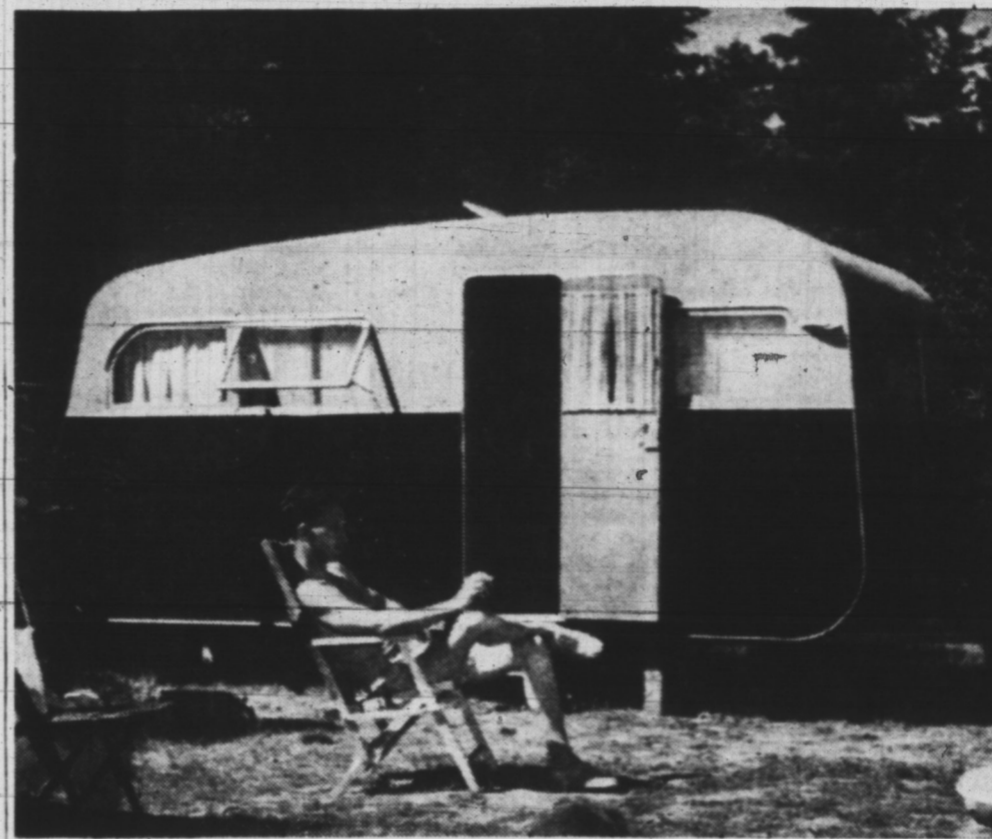
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
