## O'LEARY INSTALLS SEWERAGE SYSTEM

Construction of a modern, Hospital, A Federal Building new United Baptist Church the summer coupled with the rapid growth of the incorporated village of O'Leary in recent years has brought up a problem facing many other island centres at the present time, that of sewerage disposal.

The work of installing the trench tile for a gravity sewerage disposal system is presently being carried on in the streets of O'Leary by M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd. The 8,000 foot long system extending from Algamated Dairies in the north eastern corner of the village up main Street to the new hospital in the south west of the built up area, with branches connecting side streets, was designed by Crandall Consulting Engineering Company at Moncton, N.B. A Gradall back sloper operated by Morman Lorrish is shown above digging the trench for the tile down to an average depth of seven feet. The pumping station and sewage treatment plant will be located near the dairy.

The installation of the tile is expected to be completed this month and the balance of the work in the spring.

## S'ide Board Of Trade Gives Approval To Potato Resolution

The Summerside Board of Trade at a special meeting held last night unanimously approved the resolution drawn up on Tuesday night requesting the federal authorities for a revision of the present tariff on United States potatoes entering Canada. The resolution was drafted on Tuesday night at a joint meeting of the Charlottetown, Summerside, West Prince and the Crapaud Boards.

All four boards have now met and given approval of the resolution and when the other Island boards have signed their approval of the document the matter will then be submitted for the consideration of the Maritime Board of Trade and the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council, soliciting the support of those bodies in the presentation of the resolution to the Federal authorities.

President John S. Wright, who presided at last night's meeting, read a letter from the Charlottetown Board suggesting that a joint meeting of all the Island Boards be held in Charlottetown at a date suitable to all concerned. The object of the meeting would be to discuss common problems which concern all the boards. The letter requested that any suggestions for making up an agenda for the meeting be forwarded to the president of the Charlottetown Board.

The meeting suggested that November 24th would be a suitable date for the meeting. Wright pointed out that if such a joint meeting could be held it could mean the foundation of an associated board of trade set up in the Province.

## Looks For Third Nfld. Paper Mill

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Premier Smallwood says prospects for a third paper mill in Newfoundland are the "best yet" and to back up the statement he's poised to fly off to New York and Rome.

The New York trip is scheduled for this weekend. Mr. Smallwood accompanied by Gordon Pushie director general of economic development will be met at New York by the private aircraft of Carl Landegger chairman of the board of Parsons-Whitmore. The company is associated with pulp and paper mills.

They will then fly to Connecticut for talks regarding the establishment of another paper mill in Newfoundland. Mr. Smallwood said. The present big mills are at Corner Brook and Grand Falls. Sites mentioned for a new mill include Clarendville on the east coast and Bale d'Espoir on the south coast.

PROSPECTS "BRIGHT"

Mr. Smallwood said "there have been ups and downs" in negotiations to get the province another mill, but the picture had never been brighter than at present.

The premier said he and some members of his cabinet will fly to Rome Nov. 15 or 16 to discuss a third or fourth paper mill with interested Italian concerns.

Mr. Smallwood said if third mill negotiations are successful a fall session of the legislature may be called.

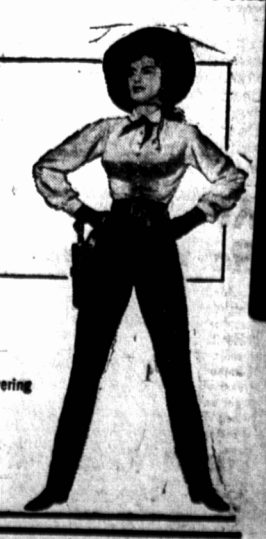
