amount to anything after all." To an inquiry regarding his appetite and possible food preferences, he said, he eats "everything put in front of me."

Born at Southwest River, New London, on Christmas Day, 1851, Mr. Cameron once lived at Kensington when the village consisted of only four families. His father's name was Donald Cameron while his mother was the former Margaret Pickering.

About the time of the gold rush in Colorado, "Sandy" joined the exodus to the west and after visiting various places in the U. S. A. he went to Winnipeg when it was only a small but rapidly growing town of 11 years.

After four years in Western Canada he returned to Kensington where he built a house, sold it and built another.

His wife who passed away on January 11th 1938 at the advanced age of 88 years was the former Flora Ellison of Princetown, now Malpeque. The couple were married in Bedouque by the Rev. Mr. Patterson. They had two children, a daughter, Mrs. Annie Bell of Elmsdale with whom Mr. Cameron resides and a son John, now deceased. He has one grandchild, Maxwell Cameron and two great grand children. A favorite of old and young, Mr. Cameron is a story teller, par excellence, and his stories are punctuated with his ever present keen sense of humor.

Widely Known

Widely known in many parts of the country, he was especially well known by the travelling public for whom he operated the "Pioneer Taxi". A great lover of horses, Mr. Cameron, who had a vast experience as a dealer in livestock, and particularly horses, deplores the way in which "good horses" have disappeared from the Island farms, and harkens back to the days when he was the proud owner of some mighty fine ones.

Mr. and Mrs. Cameron were for some years the genial proprietors of the Albion Hotel at Alberton, in the building which is now the Western Hospital.

Looking years younger than his age, Mr. Cameron who received congratulatory messages from Queen Elizabeth and Prime Minister St. Laurent on the occasion of his 101st birthday will also have the sincere best wishes of his many friends and acquaintances throughout the province for his continued good health.
