THE PRESBYTERIAN SYNOD.

HALIFAX OCT 7.—The Presbyterian synod resumed at 10 o'clock yesterday. After the usual services A. McL. Sinclair entered his dissent from the decision and the Muller case and Rev J S Sutherland, W W Raible, James Ross, and Mr J G Forbes submitted Resolutions of appeal in the matter. The synod afterwards adopted a reply to these Resolutions, signed by Revs T F Fullerton, A Falconer and R Murray.

The commission in this case is to meet at Nashvaak N B on the last Tuesday of Oct R v T F Fullerton is moderator and Mr T C James is a member of the committee.

The report of the Halifax Presbyterian college was presented and adopted. Fourteen thousand of the nineteen thousand dollars required for the new college has been raised.

The work of the augmentative committee and the claims of the fund on the liberality of the church was the subject presented at the afternoon session. Last year \$10,000 was asked for and \$9,483 was raised. Grants for next year will be made to sixty-six congregations, five more than last year. To meet the demands upon the fund it will be necessary to raise \$10,000, with \$500 for expense, making a total needed of \$11,500.

Rev Robt Laing presented the report of the Halifax Ladies College, pointing out the excellent work done at this institution and its growing usefulness.

In connection with the report on church life and work, the synod adopted a resolution calling on parliament to pass a prohibitory law.

At the closing sederunt, Dr Gordon presented the report of the committee on public education and civil rights. The synod ordered in this connection that presbyteries make full enquiries as to how fully the provisions for the reading of the scriptures in the schools are carried out; that such action be taken as they may deem expedient to give effect to these provisions.

A resolution was passed disapproving of the action of the Presbytery of St John in appointing an elder moderator. Synod adjourned sine die.

FUNERAL YESTERDAY.—The body of the late Francis Monaghan was interred in the Roman Catholic cemetery yesterday afternoon. Mr Monaghan was a member of the Benevolent Irish Society and the members of that organization attended the funeral in a body having with them the League of the Cross Band. The services at the Church and at the grave were conducted by the Rev. Father Johnston.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon Sarah Ann McIntyre was convicted of violating the Liquor Regulation Act by selling intoxicants in a room not fitted up according to law, and was fined \$100 or two months imprisonment. James McCabe, convicted for assaulting his wife, was fined \$10 or 30 days in jail, the sentence to be suspended during good behaviour. The Liquor Regulation summons against John Connors was dismissed.

HANGED AT SALEM.—Alfred C Williams was hanged at Salem, Mass., on Friday morning, for the murder of the Italian Gallo. The gallows was set up in the corridor of the jail. The condemned man made no public statement, but in conversation with his friends he asserted his innocence. His body will be buried at Salem. The real name of the unfortunate man is McWilliams, and his parents live at Ives' Point, a few miles from Summerside.

FISHERY CRUISER SPORTS.—The annual sports of the officers and crews of the vessels forming the Fishery Protection Service will be held in Georgetown on Wednesday next. These sports are well worth seeing as the Canadian blue jackets are a fine body of men, second to none as athletes. In connection with the sports the railway authorities will issue return tickets at special rates. Six vessels will be in the harbor, and some 300 officers and men will compete in the various events. They will be worth seeing.

Since the destruction of their building by fire in September of last year the work has been carried on in old Government House, which was granted for two years by the N B Government. The work of the school has made very satisfactory progress during the past year, forty one pupils being enrolled, one bright little boy being from Charlottetown.
