

Confessed Too Soon.

Able, the genial assassin who had been relieved for thirty days by the Governor, has made a fatal mistake. He was to have been hung last Friday at Carthage, but some of his friends imagined they had discovered proof of his innocence, and sent a telegram to Jefferson City, signed by influential men in Jasper County, as follows:—

"New and startling developments in Able's case—possibly true. Stay execution thirty days, and prevent the man's life from being wrongfully sacrificed."

So the Governor granted a reprieve for thirty days, but his order did not reach Carthage until Friday morning, and Able, thinking his last hour was near at hand, had made a full confession of his crime late on Thursday night, in the presence of several witnesses. This was his fatal mistake. He should have held his tongue.

RAILROAD BUILDING.—The Railroad Gazette gives the total miles of railway constructed during the year 1877 as 2199. In 1876 it was 1400; in 1875, 1561; in 1874, 2025; in 1873, 3383. The total last year was above the average since 1873. The increase seems to have been wholly on short lines, the longest being 120 miles, and the average of all lines constructed being but 1878. The average length for all was less than in any recent year except 1874, when it was 16.6 miles. The Gazette hears of but new projects for the current year. A good many lines will be extended, and construction will be continued on uncompleted lines.

TOLEDO, O., Jan. 30.—Doctor Charles Morton was arrested with two confederates recently for body-snatching. Two bodies exhumed and sent to the Medical College at Ann Arbor were recovered. Soon after Morton's arrest he complained of sickness, and his body was found covered with eruptions, and several physicians declared it small-pox. Upon the Board of Health's order Morton was conveyed to the pest house, where he seemed to convalesce rapidly. Some asserted he had applied cotton oil to his body, producing the eruption. The excitement became intense last night on the announcement that Morton had made his escape while on guard at the pinner.

WAR NEWS.

New York, Feb. 5. Gold 102 1/2. Exchange unchanged.

London, Feb. 5. Preparations are being made to close the Sound and approaches to Copenhagen by means of torpedoes in twenty-four hours if necessary.

It is reported that Austria is about to present a note refusing to sanction any peace conditions which imperil the existence of Turkey.

A Bucharest correspondent says that he had an interview with General Ignatieff, who informed him that Russia wished to open the Dardanelles to Turkey and herself, only excluding the fleets of other powers, and that she insisted on the cession of Armenia, as any endeavor to obtain a money indemnity from Turkey was hopeless.

Russia has formally acquainted Rumania with her intention to annex Bessarabia, giving Rumania Dolradsha in exchange for it.

Rumania has addressed a note to the Powers claiming the right as a belligerent to participate in the peace conference.

The Peace papers announce that an Austrian army corps has been mobilized and is concentrated at Vizzei.

The Greeks captured Dornice at the point of the bayonet, losing 150 in killed.

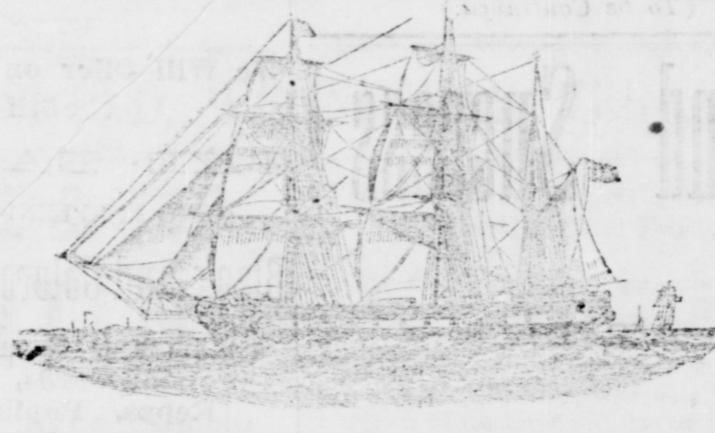
