**THE PROVISION MARKET.**

**Bacon and Lard in Liverpool Decline—Chicago Advances.**

There is no new feature in the Montreal provision market. The demand is reported fair for small lots, and trade is fair for the season. We quote:—Canadian pork, in barrels, \$16 to \$16.50; pure Canadian lard in pails, 8 1/2c to 9c per pound, and compound refined at 5c to 5 1/2c per pound. Hams, 10 1/2c to 13c, and bacon, 10c to 13c per pound.

In the Chicago provision market pork closed at an advance of 2 1/2c to 5c, closing \$7.85 October; \$7.85 November; \$7.90 December; \$8.05 January. Lard closed 2 1/2c higher at \$4.85 October; \$4.85 November; \$4.87 1/2 December; \$4.95 January.

A weaker feeling prevailed in the Liverpool provision market for bacon and lard, and prices for the former declined 6d to 1s, and for the latter 9d. Pork, 50s, lard 27s. boneless long cut heavy bacon, 32s; long cut light, 31s; 6d; short cut light, 31s 5d; and tallow, 20s 6d.

Cash quotations on provisions closed at Chicago:—Pork, \$7.85 to \$7.90; lard, \$4.92 1/2 to \$4.95; short ribs, \$5 to \$5.30; shoulders, 4 1/2c to 4 3/4c; short clear sides, \$5.10 to \$5.20.

**DAIRY PRODUCE**

**Cheese Firm—Butter Very Heavy in Tone.**

The Montreal Gazette, Tuesday, reports: Cheese had a steady feeling today and the business at the wharf recorded fractionally better prices than were obtained last week, the ruling price being 8 1/2c, as against 8c a week ago. The offerings were 3,000 boxes, and they sold at a range of 8 1/2c to 8 3/4c. While there is no change in the English market, there is a fair demand. There is some speculation in the market as to the effect of the suspension of a leading firm on the British market. If the goods held by them are thrown upon the market suddenly it would, no doubt, have a depressing effect, but it is thought that as the bills drawn against them would be for different dates, they would only be sold on the maturing of these bills, and thus be gradually absorbed. Receipts were 10,882 boxes.

Butter is a very dull market, and advices from abroad are not encouraging. For choice creamery in boxes, 18 1/2c is asked, but it seems doubtful if anything above 18c is realizable. Other grades are correspondingly low. Receipts were 442 packages.

**CHARLOTTETOWN MARKETS.**

**Not a Very Brisk Movement in Produce—The Prices.**

There is not a very brisk movement in produce just yet, and there are no material changes in prices since last week. The schooner Marie is being loaded at Charlottetown for Bermuda, and there are some other schooners loading at Pictou and Mount Stewart.

The buyers are paying 25c for blue potatoes, and says that reds can be got a little cheaper. There are not a great many moving.

The movement of oats is also reported slight, and 29c is the prevailing price. In London, according to Beerholm's Corn Trade List of Oct 19, 15s 6d is the quotation for Canadian white oats, 320 lbs. Eggs are quiet at 12c. Buyer's receipts pretty well in. It is said that since our last report between 1000 and 2000 boxes of hen fruit have been shipped abroad, mostly to the Old Country.

There are no new developments in the market for hogs. The price is about the same as last quoted, viz. 4 1/2c for bacon and 4c for heavy fats.

**Live Hogs.**

At the Grand Trunk stock yards, at Montreal, on Monday last, the receipts of live hogs were 300 head. The demand from packers was good, and prices were firmer. Selected sold at \$4.40, heavy fat at \$4.25, light weights at \$4, and stags at \$2 per 100 lbs. At the Canadian Pacific stock yards there were 200 live hogs offered, which sold readily at from 4c to 4 1/2c per lb., as to grade.

Chicago advice of Monday state that there was an excellent demand for hogs, and prices averaged a nickel higher; fair to choice, \$3.62 1/2 to \$3.80; packing lots, \$3.25 to \$3.60; butchers, \$3.40 to \$3.80; mixed, \$3.35 to \$3.75; light, \$3.30 to \$3.75.

**ORWELL NOTES.**

Messrs Neil A Gillis and James A Nicholson, Orwell Cove, have been awarded the contract of erecting the new school house at Vernon River. Their tender was in the vicinity of seven hundred dollars.

Our diligent milk haulers, Messrs Nicholson Bros, still continue their onerous duties. Butter making in the Orwell factory has begun.

Our school is progressing favorably under the able tuition of Mr P J Bolger. Anderson's mills are running full blast. So we say that they are getting very fair flour out of wheat that was thought to be fit for nothing but feed for the pigs.

The residence of Mr Murdoch Matheson, Lyndale, narrowly escaped being burned to the ground during the gale on Sunday last. It appears that all the inmates were absent with the exception of Mr Matheson who had occasion to go out to do some clothes. Before going out he put on a rousing fire, and after being out some time he went into the house where he found the kitchen in a blaze and the flames wending their way to the roof. In the cupboard was a can of kerosene oil. Murdoch, thinking that if the fire got in there the house would be gone, he rushed through the mad-dancing flames and fortunately got the can and threw it out. By this time neighbors were on the scene and managed, after some difficulty, to get the fire out. Mr Matheson escaped with burned whiskers and eyebrows and a few scars.

Mr Donald A Nicholson, Kinloch, planted 29 rows potatoes and yielded therefrom this fall 13 full carts. It is singular to note that about two years ago Mr Nicholson yielded from the same acre 50 stocks gold round oats, which, when threshed, yielded about 30 bushels; and his winter supply of potatoes all grew together on the same piece of ground.
