He is not called upon to write a private critique on the article to the author of it. His rejection or acceptance is an absolute and unquestionable fact. Among amateur writers this does not appear to be understood. It is an unjustifiable impertinence to ask the managing editor his reason for publishing or not publishing any matter submitted to his judgment. Outside writers and aspiring amateurs rarely seem to comprehend this truth, and their transgressions are largely from ignorance rather than intention. The nature of editorial work requires absolute power of decision, in order to preserve the nature of the journal the editor constructs.

SHIPBUILDING OF THE CLYDE.—The Glasgow Herald says that during the month of June, 24 vessels of 17,502 tons were launched on the Clyde; of these, 11 were steamers of 7,369 tons, 5 sailing ships of 9,997 tons, and 8 yachts of 292 tons. These figures compare favorably with the average output per month during the year, so far as it has gone. The output in January was 9,140 tons; in February 11,369 tons; in March, 8,169 tons; in April, 23,497 tons; in May, 14,957 tons; and with this month's figures the total for the six months of the year reaches 84,623 tons.

THE governor of Newfoundland was recently waited upon by a deputation of working men and presented with the following petition:—"The petition of the undersigned, laborers and fishermen, and inhabitants of St. John's sheweth: That there is no fish to be caught, no work or labor to be had, and that the town is filled with idle men who are in a state of extreme destitution and cannot exist unless employment is given us immediately; that we receive but three days' work in a fortnight at three shillings per day, out of which we have to support our families; that we peaceably and quietly, as loyal subjects, petition your excellency to advise your government to give us work at once, as we do not want to be driven by famine and poverty into a breach of the peace."

A CORRESPONDENT of the St. John Telegraph writes from Margate, P. E. Island, (July 21): "It would be greatly beneficial to the health and spirits of people living in the interior of the province to visit for a short time during the hot weather this beautiful island of the Gulf. Being comparatively narrow, and with the strongest of salt water laving its shores, the island is almost always fanned with refreshing breezes. More perhaps than the usual number of tourists are now rusticating at the various places of summer resort and with their friends throughout the Island. The country now is well watered and vegetation is rapidly advancing. The point at which I write is a lively little village, though not so lively in many respects as before the building of the P. E. Island Railway. Kensington—village two and a half miles to the west on the line of railway, is now the chief place of business of the municipality. The character of the water is much improved."

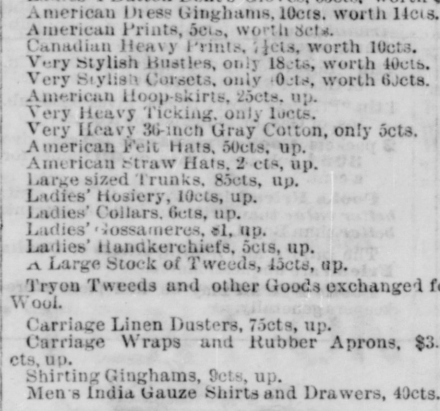
