Later on in the week he won the Free For All Trot, California bred, purse \$3,500, with Judy Tass in 2:03 2/5 and was second in the A Trot, purse \$2,500 with D'Artagnan, time, 2:03, and third in the Golden West Pace, purse \$34,400, with Prince Jay. The time was 2:22 1/5 for a mile and three-sixteenths—a new world's record. He then finished off the afternoon by winning the AA Trot, purse \$2,300 with Beck Hanover, defeating the practically unbeaten Nancy Song. The time by quarters was 28 1/5, 1:00 4/5, 1:33 2/5, 2:02 4/5. 14,569 people saw that afternoon's racing and \$855,287 passed through the pari-mutuels.

The Hollywood meeting extends for another week beyond the above racing, but at the conclusion of the above the leading drivers were: Joe O'Brien, 77 starts, 28 times first, 14 times second and eight times third; Don Hall, 55 starts, 17 times first, 13 times second and eight times third. Money won: Joe O'Brien, \$72,922.50; Benny Schue, \$48,675; Don Hall, \$43,962; H. Fitzpatrick, \$33,842 and F. Funderburk, \$27,730. Joe is certainly ending the year with a remarkable series of wins. No driver in our memory, except Tommy Murphy or Dr. Parrish, showed such ability to judge pace and know the right time to make the right move as Joe does. With it all he is a modest chap, remarkably well liked by race-goers who pin their faith on him and he gives all he has in an effort to win.

One of the world's greatest brood mares passed on recently—Belle Mahone 4, 2:12 1/4, at the home of her owner, McKinley Kirk, Washington Court House, Ohio. She was the dam of eight in the 2:10 list including Valdo Abbe 2:03, Betty M. 2:04, Cash Counter 2:05, all records taken over a half-mile track, and her daughters have been remarkable in the production of speed, being credited with H.D. Hanover 1:58, Pleasant Surprise 3, 1:58 3/5, Floating Dream 3, 2:00 3/5, Times Square 3, 2:00 4/5, Waverly Ann 2:02, Frank Jackson 2:02 4/5, Natalia C. 2, 2:03, Lady Ahorney 2:04, Cash Kirk 2:04 1/5, Honest Truth 2:05 (h.m.t.), and five others with records better than 2:10. Honest Truth is the dam of Honest Abbe 4, 2:06 1/5, the high-class pacer that Don MacNeill bought at Harrisburg for

distant rumble of a double . . . the momentarily . . . the night takes over and one sign as the breach in broke and the shells slide into the hunting coat pocket. It's a long wait till the snow flies and fades with spring's warm breath, summer wanes and autumn leaves crimson and fall.

It's a long time since I have seen so many black ducks in our rivers and bays at the end of a shooting season. Fat, northern blacks lie in rafts that defy counting . . . they might hold two thousand or five thousand . . . as they bob with the waves in close packed formations hundreds of yards long and a half gunshot wide. American Golden-eyes (Whistlers) rise in hundreds and the music of their beating wings remind one of distant chimes. Thousands of geese gather in majestic squadrons and their massed honking throbs in the night.

Just now hunters will re-act to watching so many tasty dinners floating just out of gunshot and

contract, since the declarers eventually lost two diamond tricks as well.

One South, however, brought home his two-spade contract. The play went as follows:

West opened the club king and shifted immediately to the heart ten. East captured dummy's king and returned a club. West took his second trick in that suit, then shifted back to hearts. East cashed his queen and, to avoid setting up the eight of hearts (when South's nine dropped) led back a low heart to let his partner ruff.

It was somewhat tempting for South to discard a diamond on this trick, because if West had one more low heart, dummy's eight-spot would win. But South, after long thought, decided against this move. The opponent's lead and plays in hearts convinced him that West was now void of the suit and would ruff, so nothing could be gained by discarding a diamond from the closed hand.

Instead, South ruffed the heart return high, drew trumps and ruffed dummy's last heart, then led the ace and a low diamond. What he had hoped for, happened. East, in with the diamond king, had to give South a ruff-and-discard by returning a heart or a club.

the season closed is a question we will be better able to class an opinion on after Christmas. It was a lengthy season and birds plentiful but the kill was light. Blue Bird weather is the main cause for hunters having empty, or near empty, deep freeze compartments. I never remember a fall with so little wind and the waterfowl sure took advantage of our Florida weather. Hunters who have been lucky in bagging wildgeese tell me that the birds have gotten back the old familiar sweet flavour that comes from an eel grass diet. The odd meal of wheat, oats or barley sandwiched in make them taste just so much better.

Farmers tell me that compact covers of Huns have emerged from seclusion and show little or no signs of wear from the past hunting season. I guess some of them didn't even know there was a war on. Cock pheasants are staging sparring matches in districts where hunters never laid eyes on one during the open season. One sometimes wonder just where they do betake themselves.

Hunters who follow the hounds are agreeably surprised at the number of rabbits on the rounds. The bunnies are now white and are more plentiful in some sections than they were last year despite the army of foxes on the prowl. One wonders how there can be a rabbit left but Nature has provided ways and means for her children to survive when the going gets tough. I believe that mice are the answer, in part at any rate. Some swales are pretty near crawling with the rodents. The rabbit season extends to January 31. The swamps are pretty wet and hunting conditions are not too favourable at present but a sharp frost will mend matters. Unless snow falls shortly the rabbits are at a disadvantage and the kill will be proportionately heavy.

There is a wide divergence of opinion regarding the number of Ruffed grouse present this fall. Some hunters claim they are very scarce but there are others who insist they are present in about the same numbers as last season. The 'Natives' appear to have moved back into the swamps and swales more than was their wont in former years. Methinks hunters prowling the stubble in quest of Huns are the cause to a certain extent. The Ruffed grouse is a top game bird and it will be a sad day if they ever fall below the safety margin. On the surface our grouse are barely holding their own but I am convinced there are more black ruffed-necked beauties, particularly in southern Queens and King's counties, than is thought by many observers. The Ruffed grouse is a past master in the art of camouflage and one frequently passes within a few feet of one without even dreaming an old drummer is almost within spitting distance. It is well that such is the case.
