HALIFAX — Doctors reported Wednesday night that Nestor Blue of Little Sands, P.E.I., unconscious in hospital since a car accident nine days ago, was showing "only slight improvement."

They declined to give his specific injuries but said so far an operation has not been necessary.

Blue, injured March 31 near Pugwash, N.S., is employed on the Lord Selkirk, a ferry which plies between Caribou, N.S., and Wood Islands, P.E.I., on the Northumberland Strait.

The accident occurred while Blue, accompanied by Willie Ross of Iris and Dan Panting of Wood Islands, was heading for

Pictou. All three men work on the Lord Selkirk.

The car he was driving left the road and snapped a telephone pole injuring the three men and demolishing the car.

Ross and Panting were released after treatment at a hospital in Pugwash. Blue was taken to Halifax General Hospital in an unconscious condition. Ross suffered a broken collar bone and Panting a bloody nose.
