About Lightning Rods.

Rods, although they may not entirely protect a building, may preserve it from being seriously damaged. The Jefferson physical laboratory of Harvard university is protected in the following manner: Each of the chimneys is provided with rods which are connected with conductors running along the eaves. From the corners of the roof conductors are led to the ground and are connected underground with a conductor which entirely surrounds the building and which is connected to a permanent water supply at least ten feet below the surface of the ground. Iron pipes are driven to reach this water supply. This is as near an approach to a cage as circumstances would permit.

A trolley car has a lightning rod in its trolley, which is connected through its motor with the rails and the ground. It is not beyond possibility, however, that a discharge descending the trolley arm should refuse to go through the motor and should seek a quicker oscillating path through the car. This is not likely to happen often, for the network of the trolley wire and the telegraph lines of a town or city, together with the electric light wires, separate and divert into many channels the electrical disturbance. The great increase of wires in our cities serves to protect from great damage by lightning, for many paths are offered to the discharges, which are thus broken up into more or less harmless sparks.—Professor John Trowbridge in Chautauquan.

Black For Argentina.

Despite the efforts of the government the locusts have been devastating the crops in the Argentine Republic, according to advices received by the bark Maria L. The Philadelphia Record says: "One way devised by the government's officials to destroy the locusts was to collect the eggs and burn them, a bounty being given to those who did the work. No less than 1,000 tons of the insects had been collected at La Plata alone when the Maria L. left there. It was with some difficulty that the sails of the Maria L. were stowed when she was getting under way at La Plata, as thousands of the locusts had made the folds of the sail their homes. Captain d'Urso states that the future of the republic was never gloomier, the crops having been largely ruined, and a famine is threatened."

France's Great Show.

France will spend \$20,000,000 on the coming exposition in 1900, presenting its capital in a blaze of glory which it has never before approached, and, if the thing is possible, entirely eclipsing the magnificent display at Chicago. Ten million dollars is to be spent on the palaces in the Champs Elysees, Champ de Mars, Esplanade des Invalides and on the quays, \$1,000,000 on the bridges across the Seine, \$1,000,000 on the electric and mechanical services, and so on. The expenditure proposed seems moderate in comparison with that which the Chicago exposition incurred, but in the hands of these clever Frenchmen it will no doubt make a showing worthy of the country and of the new century which it thus ushers in.—New York Tribune.

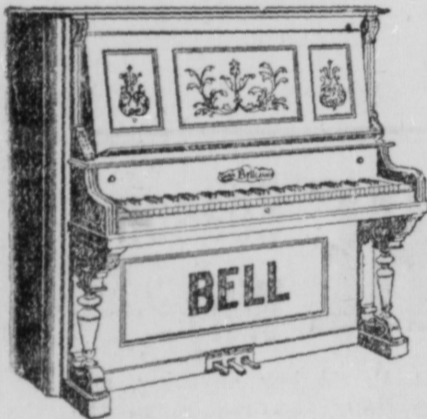
